VILLAGE OF ACTON



NOTICE

The Municipal Council of the Village of Acton will, after the expiration of one month from the date of this notice, take into consideration and pass by-law to stop and close the following streets or highways or allowances for same, or parts thereof, in the said Village, namely:

1. That part of Elgin Street between Lot 8, Block 24, Plan 227, and Lots 5 and 4, Block 25, Plan 227, in the Village of Acton, known as that part of Elgin Street lying south of lands shown on Plan 227 as Toronto Suburban Railway lands, and being more particularly described as follows: Commencing at the easterly angle of Lot 5, Block 25, Plan 227, thence north 52 degrees 14 minutes west a distance of 142.9 feet, more or less, to a point; thence north 66 degrees 23 minutes east a distance of 55.9 feet to a point; thence south-east along the north-east limit of Elgin Street a distance of 117 feet, more or less, to the southerly angle of Lot 5, Block 24, Plan 227; thence south west along the south easterly limit of Elgin Street a distance of 49.5 feet to the point of commencement.

2. That part of Guelph Street as shown on Plan 227 for the Village of Acton, more particularly described, as follows: Commencing at a point in the north east limit of Guelph Street distant 255.5 feet southeast of the point where the production north easterly in a straight line of the north west limit of Church Street meets the north east limit of Guelph Street; thence south west at right angles to the north east limit of Guelph Street a distance of 12 feet; thence south east in a straight line parallel to the north east limit of Guelph Street a distance of 144.13 feet to a point; thence in a north east direction at right angles to the last mentioned line a distance of 12 feet to the north east limit of Guelph Street; thence in a north west direction along the north east limit of Guelph Street a distance of 144.13 feet to the point of commencement.

Moved by Mr. Gordon, seconded by Mr. Kerns, that leave be granted to introduce a by-law to equalize the Assessment for the County of Halton for the year 1939.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Allan, seconded by Mr. Hume, that By-laws Nos. 727-728, read a first time, be now read a second time and blanks filled in.—Carried.

The above by-laws were passed after a third reading. A communication from the Town of Georgetown ran as follows: 2. The Town of Georgetown will accept the offer of the County Council of \$1,250.00 per annum for a period of eight years, towards the cost of paving the County connecting links.

3. That Georgetown will forego the annual rebate for a period of eight years. 4. The agreement now in force in regard to the maintenance of connecting links be rescinded and that Georgetown assume cost of maintenance during the above period.

5. The above subject to have approval of the Department of Highways. Council was willing to enter into the above agreement, subject to the approval of the Department of Highways, who would be approached by the Council in the near future. Council adjourned.
