Acton Band Won Trophy At the Waterloo Festival

In Second Year of Competition Acton Carried Off Top Honors — Awarded Silver Trophy and Each Member Gets Gold Medal — Bandmaster Walter Mendham Led Boys to Success.

Last year was the first for fifty years that Acton Citizens' Band had entered competition work. They were placed fourth in the Waterloo Contest and won first in the Aurora Contest. For several weeks they have been practicing for the Waterloo contest and on Saturday afternoon participated in this big annual event.

Acton Band won the contest with 81 1/2 points; Scarborough Township second with 80 1/2 points; Walkerton third, with 80 points; and Paris fourth, with 78 points. The bands from Port Elgin and Mount Forest were also in Class 4 for village and town bands. The win entitles the band to the silver trophy presented annually and each member receives a gold medal.

There were twenty-three playing in Acton Band, under Bandmaster Walter Mendham, of Georgetown, who has only had charge for the past month or so. The test selection was "Operatic Mingle." The following are those who took part in the contest:

The band has always given splendid service in Acton and district and now they are gaining fame in a larger city.

We join with a host of friends in hearty congratulations to Acton Band, to Bandmaster Mendham and every one of the boys. We are all proud of your achievement.

Citizens will have an opportunity of hearing Acton's prize winning band tomorrow night. They will parade on Mill Street and present a brief concert on the evening preceding the holiday.

A pleasant and most kindly official farewell was said to Rev. Dr. E. M. Morrow, Mrs. Morrow and Misses Jean and Sylvia, by the congregation of the United Church, in the social room of the church on Monday evening. After half an hour of singing, story and a number by the choir, Dr. and Mrs. Morrow were called to the platform and were presented with a ribbon-tied address of appreciation, a purse of gold and a basket of roses for Mrs. Morrow.

Rev. G. Clifton Gifford served several charges in London Conference before transferring to Hamilton Conference. He has spent four years in Harrison and has just completed his sixth year as pastor of St. Paul's United Church, Preston. He has earned the reputation of an able preacher, a faithful pastor and a good organizer. His brother, Rev. Dr. W. A. Gifford, is a professor in Union Theological College, Montreal.

Rev. Mr. Gifford, with Mrs. Gifford and their son, will take up their new home in the Parsonage on Bower Avenue to-day. Mr. Gifford will be inducted into formal charge of the church here at the beautiful ceremonial service being held at that occasion to-morrow evening, with the Chairman of the District and other ministers taking part. Mr. Gifford will be in his pulpit next Sunday morning, and will also be present at the congregational picnic on Wednesday afternoon, which it is understood, he will leave shortly on his holiday. The folk of the community, as well as those of the United Church, specially, are anticipating the coming of Rev. Mr. Gifford and his family with a good deal of eagerness, and it is hoped they will find congenial social circles, as well as large opportunities for work here.

Acton Pupils Broadcast from Station CFRB

Presented Splendid Program of Festival and Other Numbers in Toronto Studio

On Saturday evening the pupils of Acton Public School presented their second broadcast over CFRB, and thousands of radio listeners enjoyed the well-balanced and splendidly presented program. It was under the direction of Miss T. F. Hunt, and Mrs. Wm. Gowdy, of Limehouse, was the accompanist.

The pupils all did well and enjoyed the trip immensely. There were 92 in the party and they left about 6.30, with interested citizens, who provided the transportation for the group. It was another splendid community achievement.

The opening number was very appropriately "Canada from Sea to Sea," sung by a forty-five voice choir. "A Frolic," a kindergarten singing game, followed, and Betty and Joyce Dessureault gave a duet, "On the Wings of Song." The Junior Choir of 25 voices gave the Festival number, "Little Lamb."

Mozart's "Lovely Spring" was the title of a solo by Marjory Norton, and the dramatized song, "Gossip Joan," gave a variety that all enjoyed. "Oh, If the Merry Days of Old," was a solo by Marjorie Nelson. The sixty-voice choir presented that splendid number, "Hymn of Praise," and Betty Gibson's solo was "Daddy's Sweetheart."

The concluding selection was "Away to Rio," a well rendered trio number by Betty Gibson, Gordon Gibbons and Donald Evans. These numbers filled the half hour allotted on the program and time did not allow the presentation of four other numbers, the forty-voice choir; a duet by Donald Evans and Charles Rushmere; the boys' choir, and the double trio, by Reggie Spies, Charles Rushmere, Betty Gibson, Jean Harris, Joyce Dessureault and Donald Evans.

Mr. Maurice Boddington, that popular announcer from CFRB, was the master of ceremonies, and kept things moving smoothly. The program was arranged through the very kindly interest of Mr. Roy Lockley, Director of Music at this station. It is the third program that has been presented from Acton.

The children not only enjoyed the presentation but most of them were taken for sight-seeing trips down through Toronto, and not a few of them enjoyed the fun at Sunnyside. It was a splendid climax to the year's effort that has been put on music at the school. Winning the majority of the awards at the Festival was a great encouragement to these young folks, but the broadcast from CFRB is the highlight in the lines of school music.

Severe Electric Storm Strikes Acton Houses

Thos. Gibbons' House Badly Damaged and Wm. Cooper's Residence Also Struck

A most severe electric storm and a torrential rain struck Acton last night and caused considerable damage. Lightning struck the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Thos. Gibbons, on Main Street, and fire started at two points and gained considerable headway before it was brought under control.

One blaze was started just over the veranda and when Mr. Gibbons broke through the ceiling, he found another fire was raging above the second story above the ceiling. An alarm brought a quick response from the Fire Brigade, and although the rain was descending in torrents, the Brigade soon had a line of hose on the fire. The blaze was rather difficult to get at and water damage was necessarily quite heavy.

Mr. Wm. Cooper's house, on the same street, just two lots distant, was also struck but fire was not started. The storm was blown out and the bolt followed the aerial to the ground. The damage to the house was not heavy.

Torrential rain accompanied the storm. Sewers all over town were entirely inadequate to take the water away and streets were flooded while the rain lasted. Roadways in some places laid under a foot of water and bad wash-outs occurred in several spots where the deluge took the earth away.

The storm also created considerable havoc with the Hydro equipment. A transformer in the sub-station and one on the street, near Norton's garage, were blown out. Fuses in seventeen transformers as well as innumerable ones in residences were blown. Superintendent Wilson reports the most cases of interrupted services in years.

Prominent Farmer Fatally Injured Unloading Hay

Basil Johnston Killed When He Fell from Hay Rack to Barn Floor

While unloading hay yesterday afternoon at his farm, three miles north of Acton, Basil Johnston, well-known farmer and life-long resident of this district, was instantly killed when he sustained a fractured skull in a fall from a load of hay to the barn floor.

Mr. Johnston was storing the hay crop in his barn, with the help of his son, Elwood. He was on the load in the barn and Elwood was hauling the hay fork with a tractor outside the barn. It is thought he was standing on the front of the load and in pulling the trip rope it broke and he lost his balance, falling to the barn floor. Medical examination revealed he had struck the top of his head, fracturing his skull in the heavy fall.

He never regained consciousness and was found by his son when he came back into the barn from the tractor. Death followed a few minutes after he was found. Coroner Dr. Stuart, of Guelph will decide on the necessity or otherwise of an inquest.

Basil Johnston was one of the best known and highly-respected farmers of this district. He was born on the homestead and followed his parents in registering this farm. He was a Director of Acton Agricultural Society and every movement for the improvement of farm life and crops found in him a ready supporter. He was a member of the Board of Stewards of Acton United Church, and connected with movements and active in matters calculated for the betterment of the community.

The fatal accident is a blow not only to his wife, son and daughter, and the brothers and sisters resident in this district and elsewhere, but to the community at large. He was indeed a useful life and all share in the sorrow at its sudden termination.

End of Month the Limit for Payment — Tax Rate Confirmed at 4 1/2 Mills — Dominion Day a Legal Holiday and Must be Observed as Such.

Councillors A. Mason, J. B. Chalmers, and E. Jones were present when Acton Council met on Monday evening, and Reeve F. McCutcheon presided.

The Clerk reported regarding the collection of tax arrears and the progress that was being made. The matter of clearing away the burnt buildings on Mill Street was also being proceeded with and they would be removed by next month.

The by-law setting forth the tax rate for 1939 was read as required by Council and passed. The rate was sanctioned at 4 1/2 mills. Dates for payment were set forth as September 19th and November 20th, with the usual penalties for non-payment.

The Municipal Officer was instructed to attend to a drainage problem on Church Street between Elgin and Frederick Streets.

The matter of conduct in the public lavatories at the Y.M.C.A. was discussed with Supervisor Jones.

The matter of observing Dominion Day on Saturday or Monday was discussed. It was pointed out that this was a statutory holiday and a matter which came under the jurisdiction of the Dominion Government and it was compulsory to close places of business on the day set forth by Dominion statute.

It was arranged to hold the next meeting on Monday, July 3rd, and then adjourn for the summer recess until August 14th.
