Lessons from Israel's Leaders SOLOMON: A RULER WHO BEGAN

Golden Text.-Give thy servant therefore an understanding heart . . . that may discern between good and evil .-

Lesson Text.—1 Kings 3: 5-15. Time .- 1014 B.C. Place .- Gibeon. Exposition .- I. Solomon's Prayer to

Jehovah, 5-9.

Solomon went to Gibeon because Tabernacle, the place where Jehovah peculiarly manifested Himself people, was there (1 Chron. 21: 29; Chron. 1: 3, 7, R.V.; Ex. 29: 42, 43, R. V.). In his own eyes he was tut "a little child" (cf. 1, Chron, 29: 1; Jer. 1: 6; Luke 14: 11). He saw the greatness of the responsibility that had been laid upon him. To him office was was a great people in numbers, but that was not the most important fact about them, they were God's own people whom He had chosen. On that all kings and presidents and governors, and pastors, Solomon felt his at this time.

What he asked is of more value than all honors and all riches (Prov. 3: 13-18; 16: 16). His father's words to him and prayer for him had suggested to Solomon this request (1 Chron. 22: 12: 29: 19). Those words had gone deep into Solomon's heart. This great thing that Solomon asked we may all ask and get (Jas. 1: 5-7). It was not for his own sake that Selomon asked for an under-

standing heart, but for the people's good and above all because they were Jehovah's people. In the final analysis, the chief aim of the prayer was Jehovah's. glory.
