## Entrance Results at Acton All Acton Pupils Passed

### Thirty-nine Pupils from Acton and District at this Place — Eveleen Braida Won Highest Standing at Acton and Prize — Twenty Passed on Recommendation of Year's Work.

Once again all the pupils of the Entrance Class at Acton Public School were successful. There were twenty-one in the class this year. Sixteen of these passed on the recommendation of their teacher and the five writing the examination from Acton School were all successful.

Chabon, the Manager of the local branch of the Bank of Montreal, who stated today that at his office there are several accounts apparently forgotten, the owners of which the bank is unable to trace. Most of these unclaimed balances, he said, are for small amounts, although they run as high as \$200. The bank would like to get in touch with the owners of these deposits, but so far all efforts have been unsuccessful. It is not possible to publish the names as all confidential but it is well to check up and communicate with the banks if you have any knowledge concerning such unclaimed balances.
