First Albino Frog Found in Canada

An albino leopard frog, the second living one of its kind known in the world, according to Clyde Patch, herpetologist of the Canadian National Museum, was found in White Fish Lake, Quebec. The first known albino frog was discovered in St. Lawrence County, N.Y., in 1924, and was turned over to the American Museum of Natural History. The frog is about two years old, Mr. Patch believes, and about three inches long. Albino lack black pigment cells in the skin. The only traces of color in the frog are supplied by the dark eyes and the flesh, which reflects through the white skin of the body and lends a pinkish tone.
