BOILED FESH AND VEGETABLE DINNER

2 lbs. fillets, steaks, or pan-dressed

lb. cabbage 1 teaspoon salt

¼ teaspoon pepper

a side bowl.

14 cut diced salt pork (fat back) 2 cups water

In a heavy kettle, fry the pork to a golden brown, add 1 cup water and all the vegetables except the cabbage, which is cooked separately. Allow the vegetables; to cook for 20 to 25 minutes, add the salt, pepper and second cup of water. Lay the fish (flesh side down) across the vegetables, cover with the cooked cabbage, and cook the whole about 5 minutes more. Place the fish in the centre of a hot platter, surrounded by the cooked vegetables. The liquid remaining in the kettle may be served in




