### A HEARTY MAIN DISH

Here is a homely dish which will add prestige to your cooking. That may sound paradoxical but it's not because we mean "homely" in the very best sense of the word. This dish is plain and wholesome, economical, very tasty and just the thing to see before a hungry family on a chilly night.

- BOILED FISH AND VEGETABLE DINNER**
- 2 lbs. fillets, steaks, or pan-dressed fish
  - 1 lb. each turnips, potatoes, onions, carrots.
  - 1 lb. cabbage
  - 1 teaspoon salt
  - 1/2 teaspoon pepper
  - 1/2 cup diced salt pork (fat back)
  - 2 cups water

In a heavy kettle, fry the pork to a golden brown, add 1 cup water and all the vegetables except the cabbage, which is cooked separately. Allow the vegetables to cook for 20 to 25 minutes, add the salt, pepper and second cup of water. Lay the fish (flesh side down) across the vegetables, cover with the cooked cabbage, and cook the whole about 5 minutes more. Place the fish in the centre of a hot platter, surrounded by the cooked vegetables. The liquid remaining in the kettle may be served in a side bowl.
