CREDIT SALES COSTLY RETAIL SURVEY SHOWS

Results of a survey recently made by the United States Department of Commerce show that retail credit sales are costly. Average monthly collections on open credit accounts declined from 74 per cent. in 1937 to 70.1 per cent, in 1938. The survey also indicated that the average account was collected in 42 days in 1938 as compared with 40 days

The credit_survey covered stores in all sections of the country and included outlets with volumes varying from \$10,000 or less to more than \$1,000,000


