There were no new cases of chickenpox reported during the week ending Pebruary 24th. Time will tell whether the epidemic is on the decrease or just a. calm before the storm. Nevertheless, do not relax your vigilance to detect suspicious signs in the children.

Many people are still being incapacitated with the prevalent sore throat, and warnings must be repeated not to take any sore throat too lightly. The complications are too serious and may have the effect to cause a life-long dis-
