## Local Health Bulletin

There were no new cases of chicken-pox reported during the week ending February 24th. Time will tell whether the epidemic is on the decrease or just a calm before the storm. Nevertheless, do not relax your vigilance to detect suspicious signs in the children.

Many people are still being incapacitated with the prevalent sore throat, and warnings must be repeated not to take any sore throat too lightly. The complications are too serious and may have the effect to cause a life-long disability.

Rheumatic heart disease is usually caused by infection from a sore throat invading the blood stream and attacking the lining membranes of the heart chambers and the heart valves. The infection may come from other sources, such as tooth abscess. Rheumatic heart may exist without any joint involvement being present, and, happily, sometimes, rheumatism of the joints may be very bad, yet not any disease of the heart be caused.

The tragic thing about rheumatic heart disease is that damage is caused to the heart valves, which is permanent and cannot be cured entirely. Such conditions existing in the heart, seriously impair the activity of the individual, greatly limit the capacity to work, and may shorten the life of the person by many years.

This is an instance where an ounce of prevention is worth many tons of cure. Guard the child's future by seeking prompt treatment and best results for a sore throat, whenever it occurs.
