ALEXANDER KANNANWIN

The entire community was shocked by the sudden death, early Wednesday morning last week of Alexander Kannanwin. He had been about as usual the day previously and had dined.

Born at Cheltenham, Alexander Kannanwin was a son of the late Sarah Varnoo and Robert Kannanwin. Besides his widow, who was before marriage Isabel May Torrance, he leaves two brothers, Rev. Wm. Kannanwin, Toronto, and James Anderson Kannanwin, Shelburne.

Halton Farmers Study Hog Business at Toronto Plants

Halton farmers to a number of 220 recently visited the plant of Canada Packers in Toronto, where they availed themselves of the opportunity of seeing for themselves just what happens to the bacon hog after it is delivered to the packing plant.

On arrival at the plant of Canada Packers, the respective groups were welcomed by Mr. Hugh Murray, Manager of the Provisions Department, who outlined the plans for the day. For the first hour and a half, small groups, each with a guide, were taken for a tour of the plant, where they saw how various pork products are processed.

Following the tour of the plant the group devoted a well spent hour out in the hog pens, where, under the direction of W. L. McTullin, chief hog grader of the Federal Department of Agriculture, eight live hogs of various types and finish were discussed and each member of the party recorded his impressions on a card.

Immediately following the complimentary dinner, each group spent an hour on the killing floor, where they saw in addition to various dressing operations, the inspection of the carcasses by Health of Animals Branch Inspectors, weighing of the individual carcass by the electrically operated scale, which automatically stamped in duplicate the weight of the carcass on a ticket placed on the carcass.

and entrance be re-arranged to handle crowds better and that Arena Committee be authorized to put an extra man on to sell tickets when large crowds are expected. The Council decided to attend to these recommendations at a later meeting.

A letter was received, protesting payment of taxes in four instalments and asked that the ratepayer be allowed to pay the full amount when the third instalment was due. Council decided that the arrangements could not be changed.

Confirmation of an order for street signs was received from The Roofers' Supply Co. Ltd. These include parking and school signs. Eighteen signs were in the order.

The Municipal Officer reported that there were 136 dogs assessed in Acton this year. The Daylight Saving By-law was given the required number of readings and passed by Council. According to this by-law Daylight Saving becomes effective in Acton on Sunday, April 28th, and continues until Monday, September 2nd, at midnight.

Chief Harrop reported that the road to the town dump was filled with snow and collection of garbage was therefore impossible until the road was opened. Council adjourned, to meet at a Court of Revision.

Appeals were considered from John Harris for dog tax, claiming he had no dog. Joseph Herzog appealed for business tax, since he was not in business this year. The appeals were granted. Council resumed. Instructions were issued for seizure to be made on certain outstanding taxes and other items were written off as uncollectible.
