Political parties during the recent Federal election, bought radio time approximately 929 hours and 12 minutes—or nearly 38 24-hour days—a compilation made by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation shows. This was the total political time, including local time and subsidiary hook-ups, purchased on privately-owned independent stations across the country.

The Conservative (National Government) party booked 484 hours: Liberal, 248; C.C.F., 43; Social Credit, 19; Independent, 17; National Unity, 10; United Reform, Communist, Socialist-Labor and Labor-Farmer, took about 8 hours.
