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Annual Meeting Halton W.M.S. Presbyterial

\$5,431.90 Was Amount Raised by Presbyterial — Officers are Elected

One hundred and twenty-five delegates attended the eleventh annual meeting of the Halton Presbyterial of the W.M.S. of the United Church, which met in Waterdown Church on Tuesday, April 9th. The theme of the sessions was Christian Stewardship.

The morning devotions were conducted by the President, Mrs. Earl Wilson, who presided for that session. "The Story of the Year," as prepared by the Presbyterial, was read, followed by a Pastor's Exhortation by the Presbyterial Secretary, all of which were original. A living poster, a little girl from Waterdown, was displayed by the Temperance Secretary, Mrs. H. Caldwell, as an emblem of purity, straight from the hands of God.

She asked that more thought and prayer be given to this department and entreated them to "join hands in this matter and stop bickering." As dramatics are very popular now, Mrs. Caldwell advised the use of dramatic talent to place temperance plays before the public. Literature News was given by Mrs. W. A. Shaue.

The Treasurer, Mrs. J. A. McDonald, reported the total amount raised by the Presbyterial for 1940 as \$5,431.90. The allocation and the dedication services were given by the Presbyterial Secretary, Mrs. G. C. Gifford. Members of Mill-grove Auxiliary, under leadership of Mrs. K. Cummins, took part in the Quiet Hour, with solo by Mrs. R. Trask.

At the dinner hour, the President of Waterdown W.M.S., Mrs. O. A. Sherwin, in extending greetings from the local Auxiliary, chose an acoustic to form the word Welcome, made up of Willingness, Efficiency, Love, Co-operation, Opportunity, Method and Exert. Mrs. R. B. Galbraith, Milton, replied.

Mrs. Charles Redford, First Vice-President, presided at the afternoon session. Members of Wesley Auxiliary took charge of the worship service, the theme of which was "Peace, Be Still," with solo by Mrs. H. S. Lovring. Rev. Dr. Duncan McLeod, for thirty-two years a missionary in Formosa, who had to leave that country owing to the anti-British movement by the Japanese, and who is now conducting evangelistic services across Canada, cited many Christian results of his work among the Chinese of Formosa, whom he called his "orphans and sisters."

Mrs. H. Ing'hart conducted a memorial for thirteen members who had passed away since the last annual meeting. Mrs. Ing'hart chose the words of Jesus when speaking of Mary. He said: "She hath wrought a good work on Me. She hath done what she could," and what is true of Mary is true of our sisters whom we are now remembering with these flowers, which we dedicate to them as a symbol of the love and esteem which still flourishes and blossoms as a result of their lives. As each name was called a pink tulip was placed in a vase by Mrs. R. M. Clements.

After choruses by the Waterdown Mission Band, Mrs. A. Speight, Georgetown, Presbyterial Secretary, awarded Star of Recognition Stars to five Bands, Ballinacree, Bethel, Burlington, Georgetown and Waterdown, and explained the five requisites in making these awards. Bethel Band was singled out for special mention because it is the first Band to receive this award after only six months of organization. A participant on India was presented by the Waterdown Mission Circle. Mrs. Harper and Mrs. A. O. Ferguson were appointed delegates to Branch meetings.

Mrs. W. R. Graham conducted the election and installation of officers. An invitation for the Presbyterial to meet in Acton in 1941 was accepted. Rev. H. S. Lovring, Chairman of Halton Presbyterial, closed the session with prayer.

At the supper meeting greetings were extended by the Chairman of the Presbyterial; the President of the W.M.S. of the Waterdown Anglican and Presbyterian Churches; and the W.A. of the United Church. The response by Mrs. T. C. Dale, of Milton, stressed the bond of Christian friendship. Rev. D. W. Gallagher, President of Hamilton Conference, and a member of the Foreign Mission Board, gave instances of beneficial results in the work at home and abroad. He stated that one reason there is a way from time to time is because of the low little Christian effort and that the more we pay in missions the less we shall have of war. Community singing was conducted by Miss E. Dale Sinclair. Courtesy Committee: After the closing Mrs. Lamb extended the thanks of the prayer, all present joined in the singing of the National Anthem.

The following resolutions were passed at the afternoon session: 1. Resolved that this Presbyterial pledge its loyalty to the Temperance Federation in the task with which it is confronted; 2. Resolved that this Presbyterial approach the candidates in the next Provincial election and ask them to state their stand on the prohibition of liquor in the Province, and if they are in favor of prohibition, to sign a paper to that effect, so that later there may be no misunderstanding.
