Local Health Bulletin

The community is free from any communicable disease at the present time. There were no new cases reported during the past two weeks.

With the advent of warmer weather we must now keep in mind that flies will make their appearance and with them the possibility that they may carry serious infection to oun children.

Householders should prepare now to overhaul window and door screens to ensure exclusion of files from the home. If baby is put outside to sleep, be sure that proper netting protects him. Few mothers realize that summer diarrhoea in infants is serious and often fatal. and is directly due to contagion carried by ordinary files. Teach the older children in the home the necessity of fly exclusion, so they will keep screen doors closed, and give them exercise and diversion in the home, swatting flies that do

Over a week ago the Sanitary Inspector took samples of water from all wells and springs in the town, used for drinking purposes Thirty such sources were sampled and the results were as follows: Twenty-two rated "A", and are quite safe for drinking purposes; one raied "B," indicating slight pollution, possibly from surface water getting into the well. Two rated "C", indicating bacteria of intestinal origin present in amounts considered as reaching the limits of safety. Five rated "D", indicating water unfil for use raw. These samples were taken at a time of year when surface waterpollution might be a very important factor, if the well was not tight around the

top. Therefore all wells testing B, C, or D will be re-tested in a few weeks. All those using these wells have been notified of the condition found, for their own protection, and advised to boil the water. The samples of our municipal supply. taken at the spring and from a tap in a house, both rated "A".

Last week samples of milk from all dairies selling milk in town were taken. unannounced. The results are very satisfactory, as they indicate all milk is being properly pasteurized, and well delivered after pasteurization. The butter fat percentages were 4.3, 4.4 and 5.

Our citizens should be justly proud that they are being served with the best of milk possible, and have available an abundance of pure, spring water from the municipal system.

WORLD'S BIGGEST SHIPYARD

Now Employing 20,000 Hands

The greatest shipyard in the world, in Northern Ireland, is now working to capacity and employing over 20,000

Few outside the British Isles realize the great part Northern Ireland is playing in Britain's wartime industry, including the production of "peaceful", goods for export all over the world. The lamous Irish linen industry, for example, is now manufacturing solely for overseas customers.

Mention of shipbuilding is usually associated with thoughts of Tyneside. Merseyside and Clydeside (which produced the "Queen Mary") yet much of Britain's mercantile prestige was our en an Irish mudbank, in Belfast Lough. Ships have been built at Belfast since 1636, and the world's greatest yards is now Harland and Wolff's, at Queen's Island. The word "island" was used be--cause the earliest-shipyards were littlemore than a waterbound patch of mud. After 200 yards of minor developments, Edward James Harland, a very determined Briton, arrived in 1858 and began large-scale expansion works. Harland's difficulties in reclaiming land and carving a harbor and extending shipyards from the mudbanks were so great that

he was advised to give it up. "I have mounted a restive horse and I will ride it into the stable," was his reply, and his faith in himself and in the inherited skill of the Ulstermen working under him was justified. PROGRESS IN WOOD SEASONING

Development of dry-kilns with automatic control of temperature, humidity and air circulation has radically changed lumber seasoning practices, according to the Forest Products Laboratories of the Department of Mines and Resources. Ottawa.

.Certain species of wood can now be dried in kilns and put to exacting uses a rew days after being sawn, while other species, more difficult to dry, may be made ready for fabrication in a matter of weeks. Formerly timber was piled in a yard for several months and sometimes for years. If it was required for exacting uses such as for furniture it was held in a building for a fur her long period before being, finally usedThe use of these highly efficient dry kilns a'so eliminates to a large extent loses through checking, cupping staining and other seasoning defects which formerly were sometimes responsible for reducing the value of wood by as much as twenty-five per cent.
