Montreal comes to Toronto for games on May 31st and June 1st. The Leafs then go on the road, not to return until June 10th, when they open at home with Syracuse.

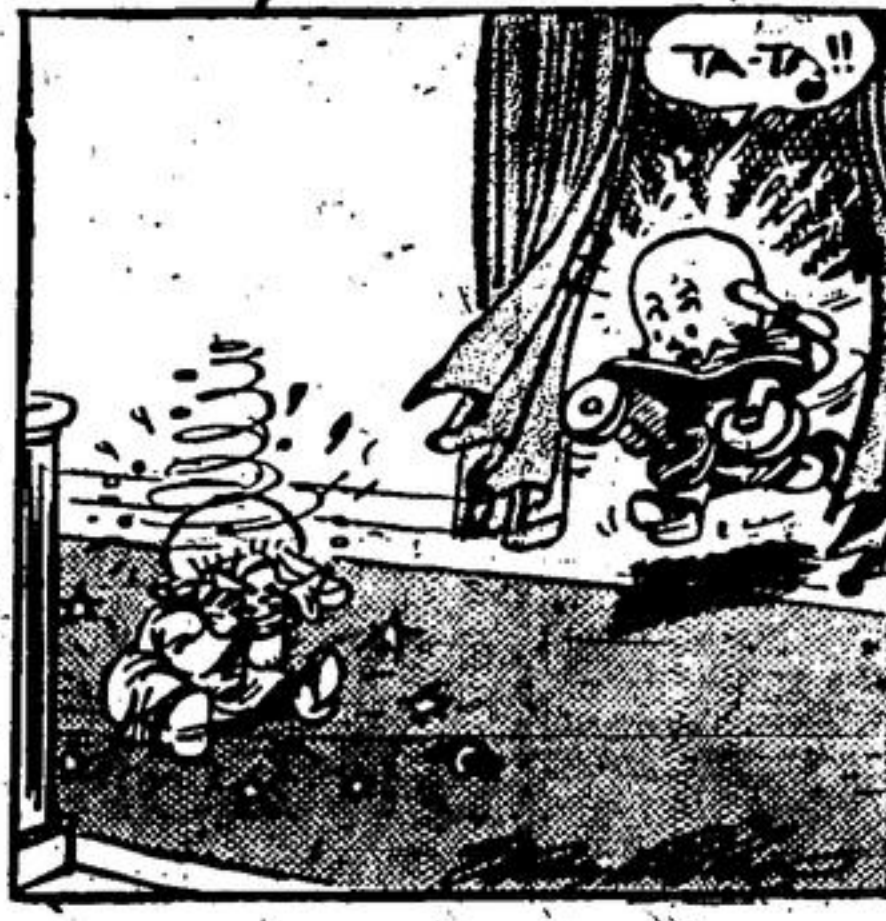
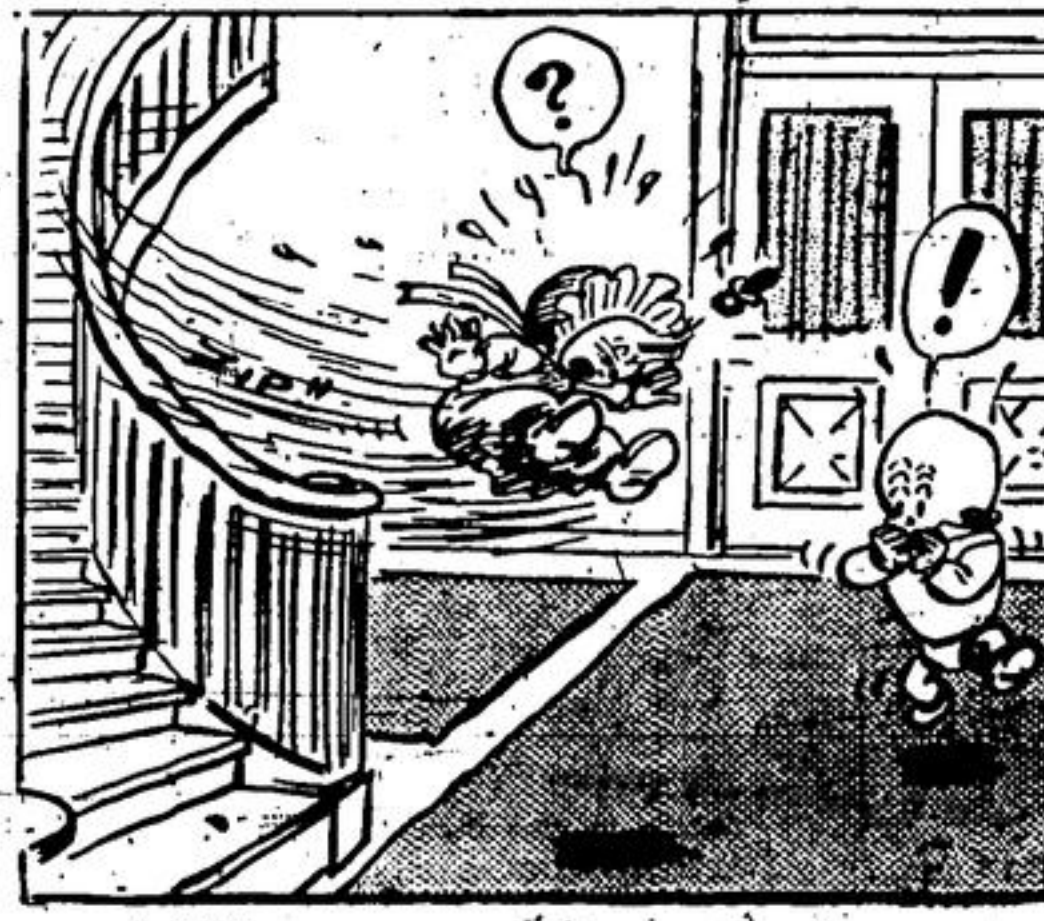
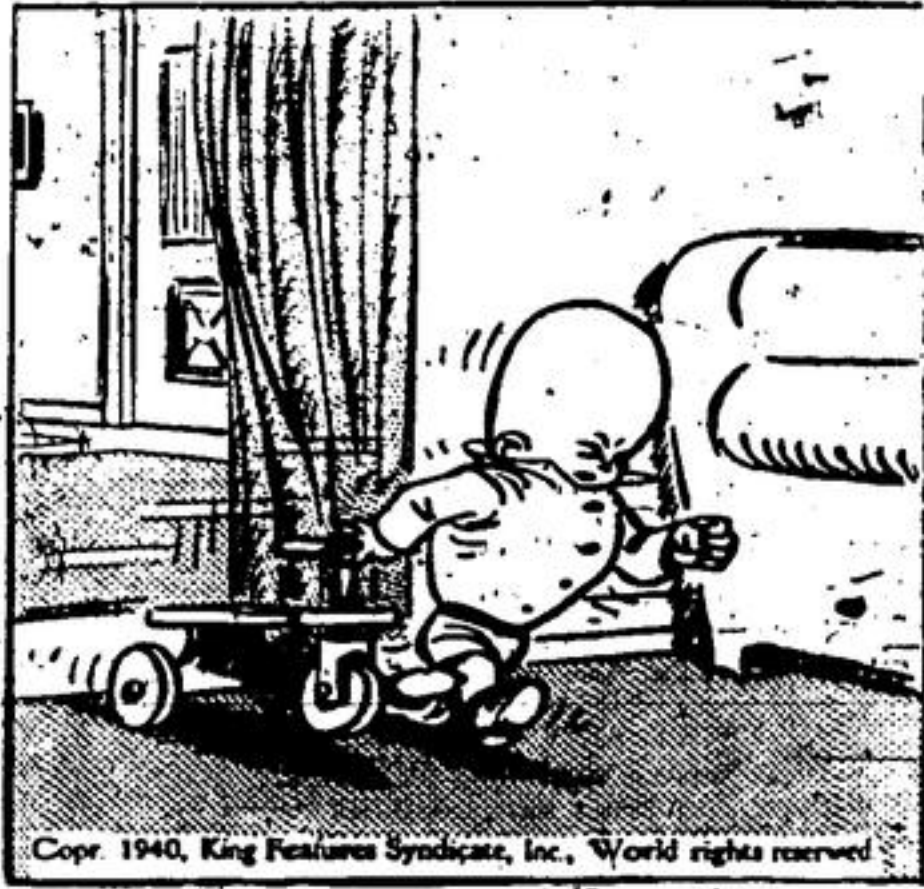
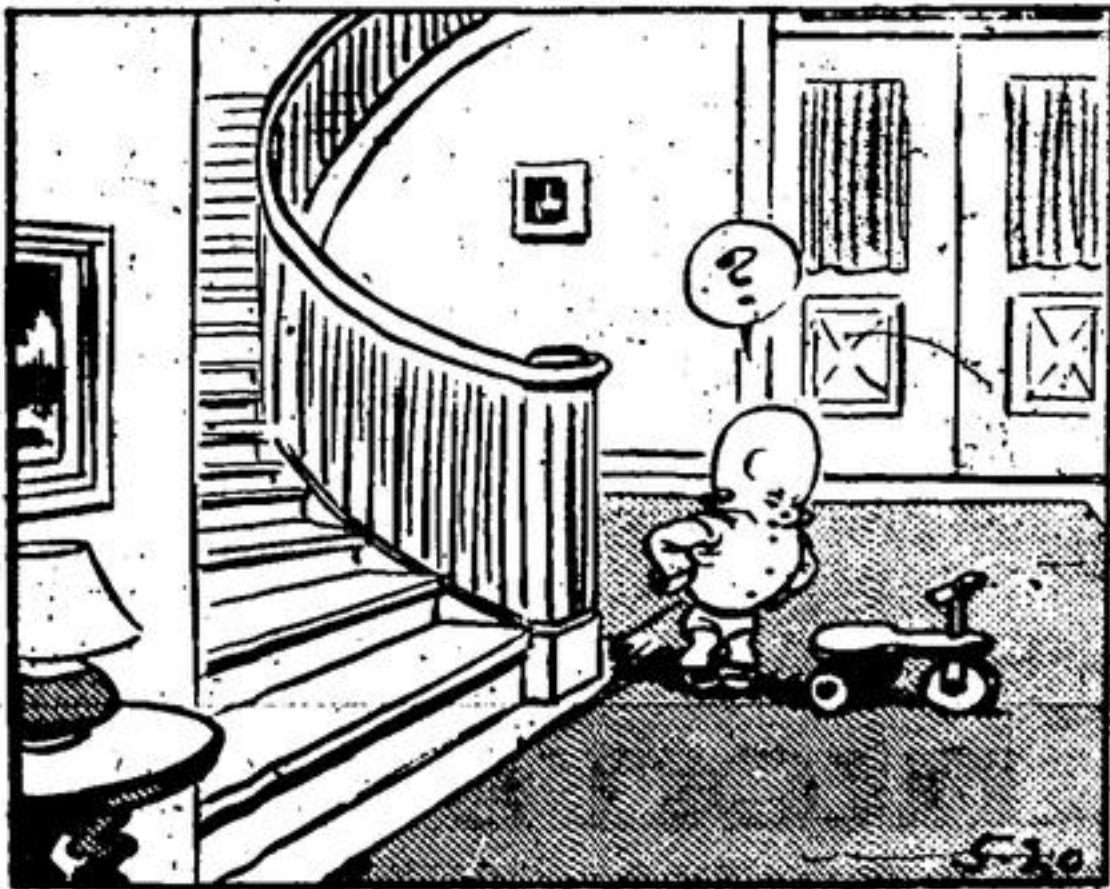


Preference for Newspapers!
