They Should be and more in relief roles. Doing Better

Despite the Toronto Maple Leafs' present unimpressive position in the International League standing, there isn't a club in the League that doesn't respect them. After beating them in both ends of a double-header on May 12th in Buffalo, Manager Steve O'Neill, of the Bisons, described the Leafs as "a sure bet for a p'ay-off berth." Others who have voiced the opinion that the Leafs will be in there at the finish are Ace Parker, star shortstop of the Syracuse Chiefs, and Roy Van Grafian, veteran umpire.

Parker, now in a Toponto hospital recovering from a serious leg injury, declares that the Syracuse players rate the Leafs "the best team we have met so far this season," while Umpire VanGraffin states that never in his career as an arbiter has he seen a good ball club suffer so consistently from bad breaks.

Tony Lazzeri, Manager of the Leafs, who confidently predicted a place for his club in the first division before the season opened, is still of the same opinion. "You got to get the breaks to win." Tony says philosophically, "and we just haven't been getting them. But it's a long season and it'll al! even up. We'll te in there before it's over."

Practically everyone who has seen the 1940 Leafs in action rates them 100% stronger than last year. The 1939 team tailed because it lacked power, but there present inc-up. Harley Box, secured from San Francisco to p'ay first base, has a mean batting average of 302 over a 10-year span in Double-A baseball. At second is Dario Lodigiani, who is leading the Toronto hitters at the moment with a mark of 325. Fred Chapman, sprightly shortstop is hitting the ball well but help but improve and, along with Lodigiani, he gives the Leafs one of the best double play combinations in the League around second base. Flea Clifton, a flawless fielder but light hitter, and Mickey DeJonghe, who packs plenty of power but is an uncertain fielder, have been alternating at third. Big Jim Reninger has already won 3 games and is a decided acquisition. Lester McCrabb, on option from the Philadelphia Athletics, has shown plenty in his two appearances and looks as if he might win 15 games without straining himself.
