COURT CLEARS DOMINION TEXTILE IN TAXATION CASE

Holding that Dominion Textile Company made no incorrect or false income tax returns, conceded no relevant facts, and fully paid the taxes assessed upon it, Mr. Justice A. E. Maclean, of the Exchequer Court of Canada, disposed of the allegations made in 1937 by Mr. J. C. McRuer, counsel for the Royal Commission inquiring into the textile industry, to the effect that full disclosures of income had not been made. The court ruled that the requirements of the law had been completely met by the company.
