Ontario News of the Week

Confirming a forecast, made in this column recently is news from Ottawa that the Alberta Government is making application, for a provincial bank charter.
As hinted previously, Aberhart and his Cabinet are seeking to secure the privileges accorded to Canadian banks without conforming to the regulations applied to other banks.

Perhaps the most interesting feature of the Bill is the fact that the proposed Alberta Provincial Bank would leave with the Aberhart Cabinet the duty of fixing the amounts of discounts or loans which may be made to the Government of the Province of Alberta, or to any one firm or person or to corporations.
It is interesting to note how the circumstances surrounding this Alberta application parallel those in England when the Labor Party was clamoring to have the shares of the joint stock banks taken over by the Government for the control of credit.

The action of the Ottawa government in outlawing a number of subversive organizations should have the desired effect of driving their disloyal members out into the open.
The Royal Canadian Mounted Police is an efficient organization and from now on, Canada should be able to concentrate on its grim task of fighting Hitler without the annoyance of groups who would set up in Canada the type of government in imitation of Hitler's.

MINES FIELD PROGRAM CANADA LEADS IN ASBESTOS PRODUCTION

Thirty-seven geological and topographical survey and exploratory parties comprising a force of about 170 men have been assigned to field work this year by the Mines and Geology Branch, Department of Mines and Resources, Ottawa.
Canada maintained her position as the world's leading producer of asbestos in 1939, when the output totalled 364,472 tons, valued at \$13,855,212.

Among other measures taken by the Canadian Government to curb subversive activities in Canada is the suspension of visiting privileges to Internment Camps at Petawawa, Ontario, and Kanamasak, Alta.
Back from a recent voyage to England and France, where he studied at first hand organization methods of the First Canadian Division and British divisions, Major-General Victor W. Odium, C.B., C.M.G., D.S.O., General Officer Commanding Second Canadian Division, is conducting at present an inspection tour of formations and units of the Second Canadian Division.

ROYAL AIR FORCE PERSONNEL LEANED UNDER PROVISIONS OF THE BRITISH COMMONWEALTH AIR TRAINING PLAN

Royal Air Force personnel, loaned under provisions of the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan will receive the same pay as members of the Royal Canadian Air Force from the date of their arrival in Canada.
