NATIONAL SYSTEM BRIDGES  
IMPORTANT STRUCTURES

Bridges are important structures on every railway and particularly so on the Canadian National Railways which in its progress from the Atlantic to the Pacific crosses great rivers, lakes and streams and in mountainous regions must straddle over deep ravines. In an article in the June issue of the Canadian National Magazine, R. O. Stewart, Assistant Engineer, Bridges and Roadway, describes many of these works, such as the world-famed Quebec Bridge, the spans

over the Niagara River and various other in steel, concrete and timber which altogether measure 187 single track miles. Structures less than eighteen feet long are classified as culverts instead of bridges and these number more than 160,000 on the system. One of the big bridges of the System is Victoria Bridge, crossing the St. Lawrence River at Montreal and measuring 6,003 feet in length, consisting of 26 iron spans. The original bridge was built between 1883 and 1889 and consisted of wrought iron tubes. In 1889 work was commenced to replace these tubes by the present open spans.


