Women's Institutes Now Save in Wartime Britain

A Women's Institute—its friends call it "our W.I."—is a countrywomen's club. The first Women's Institute in England was a Welsh one. It was founded in 1915. Now, in May, 1940, the Women's Institutes in England and Wales number more than five thousand seven hundred.

The Institute idea began in Canada. It was a very simple idea; that women living in the country should unite to work for themselves and for other people.

I have been looking down the Diary of Events for the National Federation of Women's Institutes in May and June a year ago. "Singing Festival in Berkshire. Handicraft Exhibition in Carmarthen. Knitting Conference in Cambridge. Drama Festival in Durham. Folk Dance Festival in Derbyshire. Plain Sewing School in Bucks."

The deeper purpose of Institute work is hidden in the words of "Jerusalem," the poem written nearly a century and a half ago by the visionary, William Blake, and sung, to Perry's fine tune, at every Institute meeting.

Now has come another war and with it, naturally, the quenching of a good deal of W.I. activity. There has been no great Annual General Meeting in London this year, to fill the Albert Hall with W.I. delegates from every part of the land.
