NOT TOO OLD AT 89 FOR FIRST FLIGHT

Mrs. James Mansfield, of 20 Tarilton Road, Toronto, is 89, but she is one of Canada's youngest women. She remembers the days when the old Grand Trunk Railway was a novelty. Yet she enjoys perfect health, never misses her "daily dozen," can touch her toes with ease, and in summer takes her daily plunge in Sturgeon Lake. When her children told her it was high time she took to the air she flew from Toronto to Ottawa. She enjoyed every minute of the trip and was proud of being the oldest passenger ever carried by the Trans-Canada Air Lines.

The very day Mrs. Mansfield was making her first flight, Mrs. A. L. Powers started off on the return part of hers. Mrs. Powers, who is 82, lives in Lunenburg, N.S. She flew from Halifax to Montreal, connecting with the T.C.A. at Montreal, visited her daughter and flew home again. In her younger days, she recalled, she travelled from Lunenburg to Halifax by stage coach. That was before the coming of the railway to the south shore of Nova Scotia. Mrs. Powers now thinks that the only way to travel is by air.
