We hope next Tuesday and Wednesday are exceptions. Men, enlisted in the Active Service Forces will be admitted free at Acton Fair next week. Invite your friends from out-of-town to visit you on Fair Days. Let's make it a real re-union time. Registration cards must be shown before licenses for automobiles or driver's permits can be issued. Harvesting operations have been practically halted. The rain is playing havoc with grain still in the fields. Mr. A. 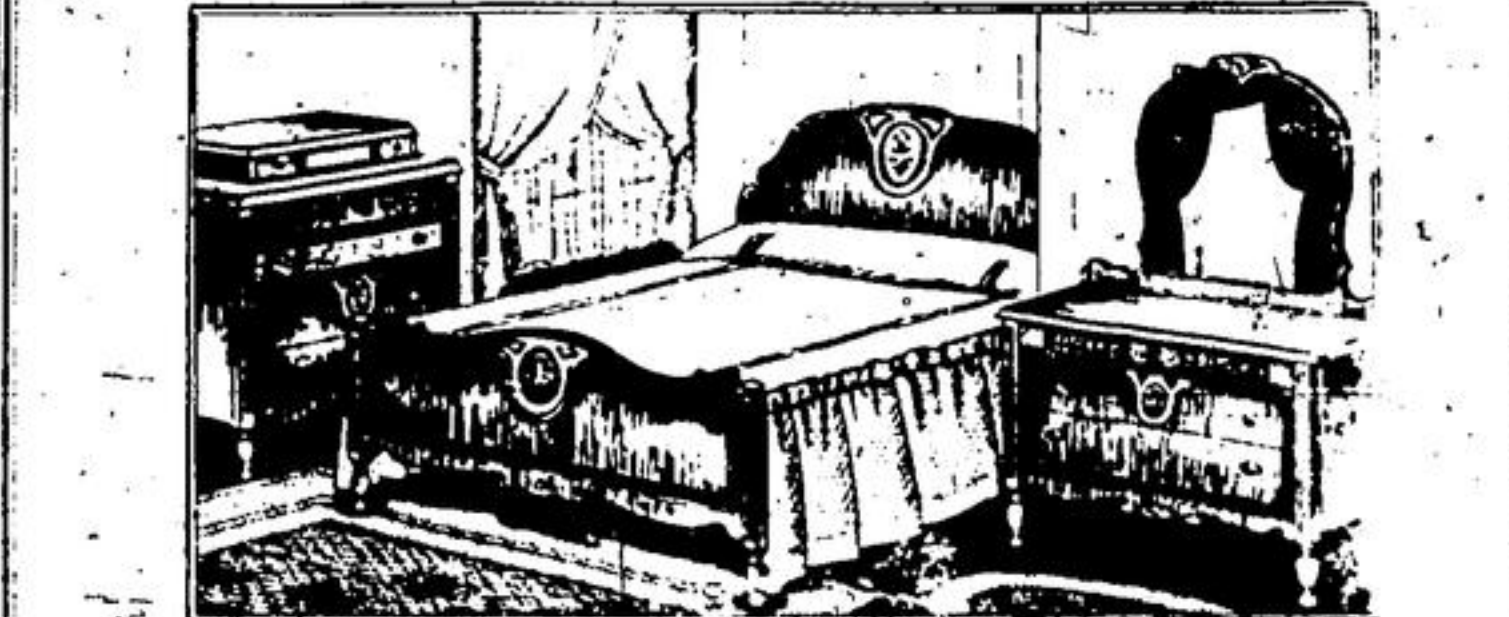

ST. JOSEPH'S CHURCH SERVICE OF PRAYER FOR WORLD PEACE

Responding to the appeal of His Majesty the King, the Premier and instructions from the Bishop of Hamilton Diocese, Sunday was indeed a day of special prayer at St. Joseph's Church. The church was crowded in the morning and afternoon. Each family faithfully took their half hour of silent prayer throughout the day. The pastor, Rev. J. L. McBride, urged all to pray faithfully for God to bless our Empire and to bring to the troubled world a peaceful and enduring peace. He also said that it must be borne in mind, however, that our petitions to God are sincere and efficacious only insofar as they are consistent with the lives we lead. Prayer, like faith, without good works, is dead. If we love God, we keep His commandments. If we love our country we must live for our country as well as pray for her.

This week in the Diocese of Hamilton, the Empire and Acton is to be the centre of special devotions for a just and enduring peace for the world. The Forty Hours Devotions will be held, starting on Thursday night, at 7:00 p.m., Standard Time. Also on Friday, Saturday and Sunday nights at 7:00 p.m. S.T. Rev. Father D. Curtis, P.P., of Drayton, will preach at these devotions. On Thursday night Rev. Father Curtis present. On Friday night sermons will be preached in English, Ukrainian and Polish by Rev. Father Curtis, Father Oretz and Father Rosicki. On Sunday night the Right Rev. Monsignor McCann, of Toronto, the Right Rev. Monsignor Blair, V.G., President of the Catholic Church Extension, Rev. Father J. A. O'Brien, Rector of the Basilica of Christ the King, and Father Traynor, of Hamilton, Rev. Doctor O'Brien and Rev. Doctor O'Neill, of Guelph, Rev. Father Kehoe, of Rockwood, and Rev. Father Dehler, of Millton, will be present for the closing devotions on Sunday at 7:00 p.m., Standard Time. Every family in the parish will pray for one hour during these days.

Halton Twins Celebrated Their 87th Birthday

James and William Hamilton, of Milton Heights, yesterday celebrated their 87th birthdays in a "twin" celebration. There was a big party and cake, decorated with 87 candles for the twins. Friends and relatives from near and far arrived for the occasion. Both are in good health and agree their hobby is "just plain work." Last week they celebrated the approach of their 87th milestone by digging their gardens and sowing wood. The two men are identical not only in appearance but entertain the same likes and dislikes and adhere to the same political party. They are of the same height and weight, both are widowers and have seven children each. Some time before the war both prophesied the conflict was inevitable "as forecast in the Scriptures." BRITAIN'S NEW LOAF Food Ministry's Tribute to Millers' War Effort

Britain's new loaf announced by Mr. Robert Boothby, Parliamentary Secretary to the Ministry of Food as a "great advance on what has hitherto been achieved by the country in this field," is the result of four years' patient scientific research by the milling industry of Great Britain. They set out to discover how to improve food value of white flour and bread and their investigations showed that the best way was to increase the amount of vitamin B1 in flour. This vitamin is essential to good health, particularly during times of strain when there is a call on physical and mental effort. British millers can now produce a loaf, fortified with more vitamin B1, which is no different in taste and appearance from the popular white loaf of today. Tests carried out by them in Britain's flour mills and in bakeries show that the bread has the full amount of vitamin B1, when delivered to the public.

"It is," Mr. Boothby told the British House of Commons, "a revolutionary step from a nutritional point of view which will attract world-wide attention."
