Neighborhood News Speaker Praises Weekly Press

An appreciation of the part played by the weekly newspaper in community and national development was voiced over an all-Ontario look-up of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation on Sunday, September 15th. In the popular "Neighborhood News" broadcast, listeners heard Mr. Andy Clarke use these words:

"This is the 500th anniversary of the invention of printing from movable metal type, and the Canadian Weekly Newspaper Association will observe Newspaper Week, October 1st to 8th. The creed of the weekly newspapers has been expressed by this year's Association President, H. E. Bice, of the Hamilton Presser, a 'Service to community and to people.' An official circular from C. V. Charters, Managing Director, announcing Newspaper Week, amplifies that code in these expressive terms: 'We first interests here. We share the joys and sorrows of our neighbor in an intimate vein only to be found in the typical Canadian town. It is because we build in our interest, the while bringing you a neighborly week-by-week history of people and things that are near and dear to you, that our readers represent a great friendly circle.'

"And how does the poet treat the subject? Listen to the words of Ralph Gordon, of Toronto:

"They've never boasted self at all, nor looted loud their horn;

"They've looked upon such ethics, mildly with contempt and scorn;

"But what tremendous weight of their great influence they've thrown,

"And through it their communities have forged ahead and grown.

"Now, 'neath a bushel, nevermore shall their great light ever stand,

"For they'll be hailed as Praetor Bull-ers—greatest in the land!"

"Friends, you owe loyalty to your weekly newspapers. They are loyal to you!"
