re Children in Public Places

Attention of parents and guardians and the owners of establishments affected is drawn to the provisions of Municipal By-laws and the Statutes of Ontario, governing children under 18 years of age.

BY-LAW NUMBER 436

16. No Minors under the age of sixteen years shall be allowed to frequent, linger or loiter in any billiard or pool room or bowling alley in the Village.

THE MINOR'S PROTECTION ACT

1. (1) The keeper of a licensed billiard, pool or bagatelle room, kept directly or indirectly for hire or gain, shall not admit a child under the age of eighteen years thereto; or allow him to remain therein, without the consent of his parent or guardian.

CHILDREN OUT AT NIGHT

16. (1) No child shall loiter in any public place after nine o'clock in the afternoon or be in any place of public resort or entertainment after that hour, unless accompanied by his parent or guardian or an adult appointed by the parent or guardian to accompany such child.

Notice is hereby given that these Sections of the Act will be strictly enforced. Parents and guardians and keepers of billiard or pool rooms are given due notice. The penalties are severe for infractions under these Sections.
