Churchill Confident

Prime Minister Winston Churchill told a cheering House of Commons on November 5th that Britain had established air and naval bases on the Greek island of Crete and that systematic bombing attacks on southern Italian military objectives would be intensified.

Reviewing the war position. Mr Churchill declared that Britain was far stronger on the home front in the Mediterranean and in Egypt than when France fell. He reported that 14,000 civilians had been killed and 20,000 seriously wounded in German air raids on the United Kingdom. From a military point of view, he said, the rise in U-boat sinkings was more serious than the al raids and the inability to use Eire ports constituted a "heavy and grievous burden" upon the navy.

Greeks Hold Invaders

The little Greek army is more than holding its own against Italy's attempted invasion. On the northern end of the front, where Hellenic forces pushed; the Italians back into Albania, it was reported on November 5th that the civilian population of Koritza was withdrawing with the town under fire of Greek ar-

Near Epirus, to the south, the Italians were being held just inside the Greek border. Meanwhile reports filtered through of British and Greek planes bombing: Italian positions. On November 3rd, the Royal Air Force bombed Naples for the second time and two days later British bombers attacked Italian cast coast ports

Reports from Greece, November 6th, indicated that the Greeks were following up their drive against Koritva The Albanian town was "surrounded a few days ago, but reports of its capture could not be confirmed. A large number of Lean Hamburg Italian prisoners was taken to Salonika

Lossen at Sea

The Admiralty announced, November 4th that the armed merchant crussers, Laurentic and Patroclus, had been torpedeed and sunk by enemy submarines On the other side of the ledger the sinkinp of two Italian submarines was reported and followed up the next day by an announcement of the sinking of two German submarines

Another contingent of Canadians has arrived in England, according to an announcement made at Ottawa, November 3rd. The contingent included Brig. 1 F. Page and his headquarters staff. battalion from central Ontario and on from Quebec.

Back for Third Term

United States electors recorded smashing endorsement of Frank Deland Roosevelt's foreign and domestic policies, November 5th, by re-electing him for a third term as President. Canadian Government ciroles maintained their usual impartial attitude towards the affairs of a friendly nation. The British press rejoiced, while observers in Washington regarded the renewed mandate as ensuring the continuance of all possible material aid, short of war, to Britain

Will Stabilize in New Zealand

Conference May Fix Prices of Foodstuffs and Standard Articles

Wellington, N.Z., November 2nd (CP) - proposal to stabilize prices of e sential toodstuffs, essential standard articles of clothing, footwear, household necessities and fuel has been made by the New Zealand Committee set up by the

Economic Stabilization Conference. The Committee was appointed to investigate stabilizing of costs, prices and expansion of production and the propos. I was made in view of the enormous demane's upon Britain's productive and financial resources for prosecution of the

The Committee was unanimous that borrowing overseas and importation of goods should be reduced to the lowest possible level. It considered there was misufficient control over rejail prices and urged that the system of price control te greatly improved.

Noting the tendency towards inflation. it condemned currency inflation as the mort cruel and unscientific method of making a levy on the people. The difficulty can be overcome, it said, by increased production.

It agreed that stabiliration of prices and wages is ineffective without complete_control of rents and lodging charges.

The Committee's recommendations which contiude with the affirmation that 'none should profit from the war, are being considered by the Economic Stabilization Conference.
