Bamples of a flattened can, which bugentously solves a formidable packing and transport problem, are now on their way from Britain to Brazil in charge of the representative of an English firm, who are the largest makers of metal containers in the British Empire. The "idea of the flattened can is very simple. The cans are made to the normal cylindrical shape, with side seams properly soldered.
