excuse it. Our ship just won't keep still. The reason, as a landlubber maxing his first trip on the lakes once said, "Hm! Must be a lot of stumps in this water!" I guess what he meant was humps. We are not going through any storm, but we are getting the after effects of the heavy wind storm we had over the week-end.

We left Hallfax 12.15 noon to-day and it has been a grand day. This is a Polish ship, and most of the officers are Polish, and as fine a bunch of men as one could wish to meet, and the most important thing is that we have a wonderful cook aboard, in fact, next to my wife, he ranks best, and that is saying something-three good hearty meals a day, with a few luxuries included, such as app'es, oranges, jello with cream, and every afternoon cocoa is served at 3.30.

I share a cabin, midships, with the third officer, who is English, and I have my meals served in my cabin, as it will be handler for me when I am in the danger zone. I sleep with my Lewis gun in my bunk with me, and my steel helmet and gas mask also at hand, including my

I have nothing whatever to do except -look after our guns, except when I am out for enemy craft during morning and evening hours, and then my duties are to keep enemy planes off our ship.

Just thought that I would close this letter now, as we will reach Sydney early this evening. It has been two grand days on the sea. In fact it was warm enough to sit out on deck this morning. It is just 12.30 Saturday. All the way we have rolled and pitched. Only interesting experience was that we were overhauled and challenged by a British armed boat, and our lights would not work to answer him with, so he had his gun crews at their stations and their heavy guns trained on us. It was a critical moment, but we managed to get signals across to notify him we were a Polish ship, with a British cargo. So don't you people in Acton ever get it into your head that Canadian coasts and waters are not protected. You would be surprised at how well they are protected by land and sea. But of course L.cannot

tell you any more on that subject. Well, that is all for this time. Sorry Carney didn't get down to see me before sailed, but I'll be back in six or seven weeks, I hope, and I hope to see you all then. Wishing you and your paper
