by Council at their last meeting, but with held from publication until such time as it had been received by the Leslie Kerns, seconded by W. N. Gilbert, "Whereas the Canadian people as a whole are anxious to make their maximum contribution in pursuing the present war effort to a successful conclusion and whereas we feel this is only possible by equal sacrifice on the part of every citizen of Canada, both rural and urban, and whereas agricultural commodities are at the pre-war level in contrast to increased prices for labor and nearly all industrial commodities, which is resulting and forcing a percentage of our rural people to leave their farms and take positions in industry to the detriment of our agriculture: is resolved that we respectfully suggest to the Federal government through the Honorable Minister of Agriculture, that immediate consideration be given to the temporary subsidizing of Agricultural commodities or the establishment labor and industrial commodities at prewar levels. And that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Prime Minister of Canada, the Dominion Minister of Agriculture, the Ontario Minister of Agriculture and the several County Councils of the Province of Ontario.

-Carried. An unusual amount of correspondence was dealt with by the Council, most of it sent on by other County Councils, of resolutions for consideration and endorsation by Halton County Council. All these special communications were laid over until the next meeting by recom-

mendation of the committee. A letter from the Ontario Municipal Board will probably give next year's Council much food for thought.
