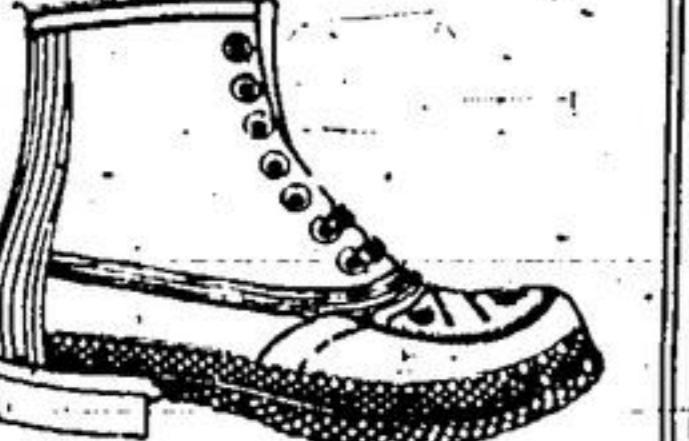

SOON "BOOM TOWN"

Not will its significance be lost to the leaders of the aggressor nations, for more than anything heretofore it signifies the totality of Mr. Roosevelt's devotion to Democracy's cause. It means that the President's great powers of leadership will be brought to bear with ever-increasing force to redeem his pledge that Britain shall not perish for want of arms.

Roosevelt Envoys And to supplies and ships the President now adds diplomatic support. His representative, Col. William Donovan, is in the course of a tour of Turkey, Bulgaria, Yugoslavia and Greece, affording the leaders of those Balkan nations first-hand information on why, as Mr. Roosevelt has declared, "the Axis powers are not going to win this war."

East African Successes Hammer blows are being dealt by British forces at Italian colonies in East Africa, following up the success of the Army of the Nile in smashing Fascist invasion troops in eastern Libya.

Great headway has been made in Eritrea and Ethiopia where the Italians are suffering from lack of supplies through the British blockade on South African ports.

Lion of Judah Again A British mission which penetrated into the interior of Ethiopia paved the way for the return of former Emperor Haile Selassie. The Negus, rallied the tribesmen, who are reported to have defeated Italian forces southeast of Lake Tana.

Capture of Tobruk, January 22nd, forced Marshal Rodolfo Graziani to move his Libyan army headquarters from the Akhmar mountain town of Ghat to the town of 115 miles west of Tobruk. Reports indicate that British mechanized forces are cutting south of coastal positions west of Tobruk with the object of attacking Benghazi and driving the Italians out of eastern Libya.

Greeks Hold Initiative It was reported from Athens January 29th, that at least seven Italian troop divisions have been withdrawn from the battlefield in Albania and re-organized because of "extreme losses."

Simu Under Arrest Premier Ion Antonescu, of Rumania, in a signed statement January 29th, charged that a midnight attempt to assassinate him earlier in the week led to the jobation that cost thousands of lives.

Charges of looting as well as rebellion were lodged against Guardist leaders, according to Budapest dispatches to Budapest. They were accused of sacking synagogues and wrecking two newspaper plants.

Ciano Off to War Italy's political and military changes continue. Count Ciano, Premier Mussolini's son-in-law, and Foreign Minister, has been sent to

the Canadian Pacific liner, Empress of Australia, which brought the King and Queen to Canada in 1939, is "safe in port," the British Press Association reported, January 28th.

After a five-day respite, high explosive and fire bombs fell on London, January 28th, causing few serious casualties but considerable property damage. Bad weather kept German airmen on the ground for days and the Royal Air Force has made only a few raids on northern Europe during the past week.

Open New Front It was reported, January 28th, that Free French forces, operating from Chad, northern area of Equatorial Africa, had started an offensive in southwestern Libya. Italian posts at Ghatum and Mrazuk have been captured and serious losses in men and materiel inflicted on the Fascists.

This motion carried. This appointment was made despite the fact that the Warden, by virtue of his office, is entitled to sit on all committees, with power to vote.
