HOT SOUP FOR CHILLY DAYS

Soup, hot—plunging hot—makes an excellent main dish for luncheon or supper on a chilly day.

The following tested recipes are recommended by the Consumer Section, Marketing Service, Dominion Department of Agriculture.

ONION SOUP

2 cups soup stock
2 cups chopped onions
1 cup water
½ teaspoon salt
½ teaspoon chopped parsley
1 cup grated cheese
4 slices bread

Cook onions in water until tender. Add soup stock. Mix grated cheese to a paste with 2 tablespoons cream. Spread on bread. Sprinkle with parsley. In each soup bowl place one slice of bread. Pour soup over bread.

CARROT SOUP

1 cup cooked carrots
1 tablespoon flour
½ teaspoon salt
2 cups milk

Press carrots through a sieve. Mix with flour and salt. Gradually add beaten milk. Reheat.

CREAM OF POTATO SOUP

1 cup hot red mashed potatoes
1 tablespoon finely-chopped onion
1 tablespoon finely-chopped parsley

Melt butter. Add onions. Cook until clear. Add milk, potatoes and salt. Heat. Add parsley just before serving.

CREAM-OF-PEA-SOUP

1 16-oz. can Standard Quality peas
2 cups milk
½ teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons flour
2 tablespoons butter

Mash peas. Cook 3 minutes. Press through a coarse sieve. Add salt. Melt butter. Add flour. Stir until it froths. Add milk. Stir until smooth. Add pea pulp. Reheat. Serve hot with a dash of paprika.

CELERI CHOWDER

2 cups chopped celery
1 cup dried carrots
1 small onion chopped
2 tablespoons butter
3 cups milk
2 tablespoons flour
Salt and pepper

Cook vegetables in 2 cups water until tender. Drain and reserve water. Add butter to vegetables. When melted, sprinkle with flour. Stir until well blended. Add vegetable water and milk. Cook 5 minutes. Season.

CORN SOUP

1 cup canned corn
1 small onion chopped
1 cup boiling water
2 cups hot milk
2 tablespoons fat
1 cup cracker crumbs
Salt and pepper
Celery salt

Melt fat. Add vegetables and seasonings. When hot add milk and cracker crumbs. Serve very hot.

Roosevelt Voice In Canada Films

President's Democracy Speech Links Ideas of Young Nations

Ottawa March 13 (CP)—President Roosevelt's voice, often carried by radio, went "through Canadian skies on airplane wings."

National Film Board officials stated that words used by the president in his January 6 speech to Congress were being incorporated in a film to be leased in the series "Canada Carries On." Called "Everywhere in the World," the film depicts the laws of democracy and freedom linking the young nations Canada, the United States, Australia, New Zealand and others.

Plans for the film had been made but President Roosevelt's words telling of democracy's goals of freedom from want, from fear and from oppression caught the imagination of the film-makers. The pictorial idea demonstrating the strength of democracy was carried through, but in the background at a certain point, will be heard the voice of the president recounting what democracy desires.

A Canadian Broadcasting Corporation record of the president's words, made as he spoke in Washington, was carried to Montreal by regular airline service and there transmitted to the film soundtrack.

Goes Farmwife And Loves It

Too Busy With Big Dairy Farm and Agrarian Meetings Nowadays to Defend Aquatic Title

Detroit, (CP)—Bonneau, city-bred Italian Tamaki Tullis has shifted her interests from mermaid to milkmaid, there will be a new U. S. aquatic queen in the free style swimming spring this year.

The pretty Detroit girl who holds the U. S. championship at 100 yards is now occupied with agricultural affairs these days to give consideration to defense of her title at Buffalo March 19 to 22.

A year ago the busy mermaid was married to Fred Tullis, owner of a 350-acre dairy farm near Monroe, Mich., and instead of shutting off to Buffalo the newlywed enrolled in a scientific-farming course at Michigan State college. It was there that Tullis' city-to-farm movement had its origin.

No More City Life

Mrs. Tullis, who spent her first 21 years in industrial Detroit, admits that once she "scarcely knew that potatoes grew underground" but now she says the farm is such a "gorgeous place that I wouldn't go back to the city for anything."

"I attend all the farm meetings—she ventures quite proudly. "Social life can wait if there is a Holstein meeting anywhere in the community."

Mrs. Tullis, who also has held variously the national A. A. U. championships at 22 and 340 yards, has participated in competitive swimming for five years. Her brother, Waldemar, holds several national collegiate and western conference records established while at the University of Michigan.

On her 21st birthday last March, Halina won the 100-yard title at Miami Beach, Fla. She now has decreed that, so long as there's farming to be done, the achievement will mark the climax of her aquatic career.

Halina met Tullis in 1938 during a meet in which she unofficially clocked the 100-yard world record at Toledo, O. Among the first to congratulate her was Tullis.

"It was love at first sight," she said.

Britain Defeats Germany

With Colossal £28,000,000 Export Of Chemicals

Germany's defeat in one field of the war effort is already decisive. The chemical industry of Great Britain shipped more of its exports overseas last year than in any period since the hectic years following the last war.

They have gone up by nearly £5,000,000 to about £28,000,000, the largest increase in any group of United Kingdom manufacturers.

Everywhere throughout the Empire and among the friendly neutrals the Germans have been routed. Britain has stepped in, sometimes with two-edged effect, where supplies of heavy chemicals from Germany, Belgium and Holland have been cut off. In Argentina, for example, she is selling most of a certain chemical that she and Germany together did before the war; for the reason that other finished products in which the chemical is used are also no longer getting from Germany across the Atlantic.

There is, moreover, a good prospect that Britain will continue after the war to supply the dyestuffs which used to come from Germany, her production of highly complex, the world's biggest peace time supplier.

Britain's progress here is unequalled medical chemicals. In pharmaceuticals Britain, by twenty years' intensive research, can meet all demands from home and overseas; certain products are even cheaper today than they were during the last war.

Excellent progress has been made in South America, India, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and the Colonies. In the United States there has been an improvement, and trade with Turkey is satisfactory.

London Makes Good Clothes

Women Dress in Modest Fashion But Big Designers Get Leave from Service to Keep Up Their Work

LONDON, (CP)—War or no war, London has never ceased to make elegant clothes of British tweeds, woolens and the like, but there is a definite limit to the amount of luxury which is fitting to wear in wartime.

I have been dreading the thought of sitting down to type out this column because there didn't seem to be a warm spot in the house. How ever I have really found one—at last so now I can go ahead. Sometimes people come in and say what a nice warm house this is. "And they are right at times. When the day is calm and bright and the sun streams in through two large windows in the living room it is a treat to sit there. But when a strong north wind is blowing as it is right now, ah, that's another story! And a strong wind at zero temperature!

This morning very early I had planned to take the car out as I had promised to take some friends over to a home where there had been a bereavement in the family, and because it was so cold. Partner insisted on taking the coal-oil heater out to warm up the car. I scoffed at the idea. "Whatever good will that do on a day like this?" I said. How ever Partner insisted on doing it and when I went out to the car about ten minutes later it was beautifully warm! Of course, I have a heater in the car but it is one of the man-made type and instead of warming the car it makes it colder for the first five minutes. So thanks to Partner I started out good and warm, with two layers of clothing, every place I could get them. The lane and the roads were good until I came to the pavement and then when I came to the first stop sign the car did a right-about-face and started coming home again! And then I found the brake seized up, which didn't help matters at all. Later on I had to travel along a back concession. There had been a flood across the road the day before so that meant shell ice to drive over and in the middle of it the car stalled. "Now I am stuck," I said to myself, and not a soul in sight anywhere. However I started up again and, after a few grunts and groans I got going again. The next trouble to contend with was frozen ruts. The only thing I could do was get in the ruts and stay there. And here's hoping nobody skidded yesterday when the roads were soft, in which case I'll be headed straight for the ditch and no way of getting out of it." I said to myself. You see there was no good road anywhere. All one could do was choose which set of ruts to follow. However I finally reached home and all might be well except that late this afternoon I have the same piece of road to travel all over again.

Well, I guess I must stop and change my plans for a while. You see this warm spot where I have parked myself is between the stove and the wall and the only objection to it is that one side of me gets roasted while the other freezes. I am beginning to feel it is time to get myself switched around again. I forgot to tell you last week that I had had my big son at home with the German measles. There seems to be plenty of it around these days and most cases that I have heard of are those of the adolescent age or young adults. There also seems to be a regular epidemic of accidents, injuries and sudden deaths in this district." Broken leg, broken foot, cracked ribs, sprained ankle, fractured pelvis, concussion, injuries requiring multiple stitches and two sudden deaths. They have all occurred in this district just recently. With every fresh accident we all ask ourselves "What next?" or "Who next?" as the case may be.

My conscience is reproaching me. This is Monday afternoon and my day for taking our Institute work down to the Red Cross. I really should be going but every time I look out the window I will... And after all I don't suppose the Red Cross packed a shipment last week so that means they will not be packing this week. The only thing is that when the work comes in I do like to keep it moving. I haven't said much about our work lately so maybe you might like to know that we have here

an approved manner.
