Moore. When he was seventeen years of age the family moved to Gloversville, N.Y., where he worked as a printer on The Leader-Republician. Later he formed a partnership in the baking business with his brother-in-law, the late Mr. J. J. Pitzer. Later he conducted bakeries at Northville, New York and at Syracuse, the latter for 38 years until his retirement last May. He was for many years a member of the Syracuse Chamber of Commerce and the Syracuse Merchant Bakers' Exchange.

Since his retirement in Acton he had been a member of the Disciples Church in Gloversville. He was one of those instrumental in forming the Blocker St. Christian Church, and in Syracuse one of the early members of the South Gothic Street Church of Christ, which he served first as deacon from 1907 to 1911, and thereafter as pastor until his death.

He was a faithful worker in Sunday School and Missionary Society. For many years at different times he served on the board of the New York and New Jersey Missionary Society, and recently was president of the Central New York District Convention of the Disciples. In 1935 he went as delegate to the World Convention of this church in Leicester, England, thus fulfilling a dream of many years of seeing the land of his forefathers.

While he had been away from his hometown a number of years he greatly enjoyed visits home again and especially did he relish the reunion held in 1929, when he met many of his former associates.

The funeral was held on Tuesday, April 8th with service by the Rev. A. F. Sanderson of Syracuse and Rev. F. Richard Eaton of Tully. Interment took place in Morningside Cemetery, Syracuse.

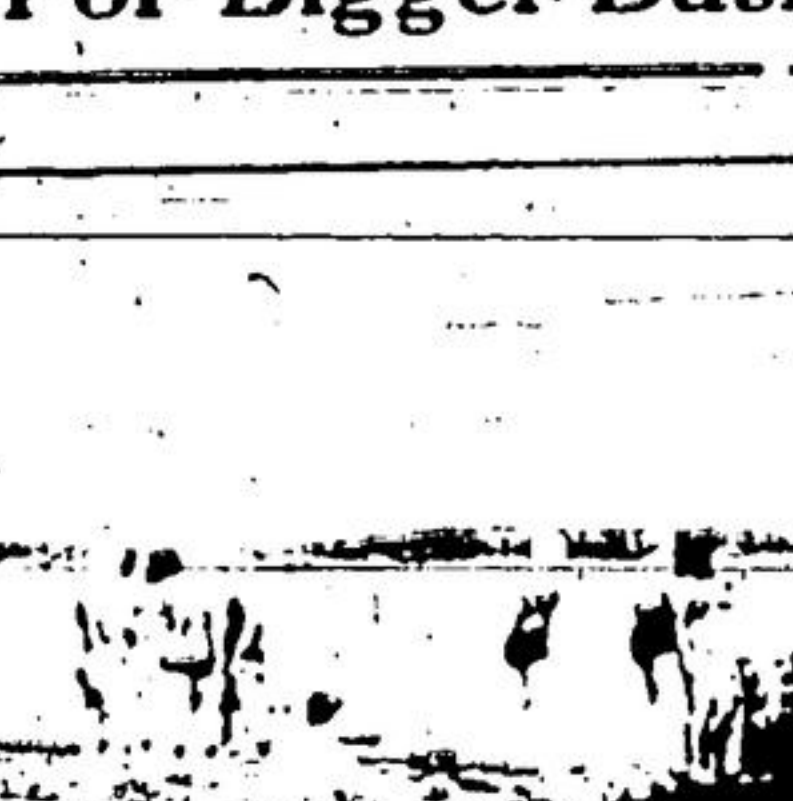
