PROVINCIAL RIGHTS. As last week ended the Dominion government was ready to give immediate consideration to any joint proposal from all the provinces for a conference to compose any differences between them and Ottawa.

REVISOR REGULATIONS. Revision of the Defence of Canada Regulations to extend further protection against unwarranted internment and simplify administration was recommended by a Commons committee set up last March under Fisheries Minister Michael.

THE COMMONS gave third reading to a bill authorizing Resources, Minister Creer to grant water storage and diversion rights to the Calgary Traction Co. Ltd. in Banff National Park, and passed Agriculture Minister Gardner's bill amending the Prairie Farm Rehabilitation Act, clarifying his position in warding contracts for less than \$5000 for P.F.R.A. projects.

AN INTERIM report of the Commons committee on war expenditures said it believed economies could be achieved in the headquarters establishments of the fighting services through greater consolidation and less overlapping.

THE REPORT suggested that final preparation of approval of a mandate for the forces be under civilian jurisdiction. The \$500,000 Victory Loan, 1921, is in its second week. There are many large subscriptions from companies and corporations but loan officials said they were particularly gratified by the excellent response on the part of small private investors.

MR. Stewart, federal coal administrator, has announced that all Canadian coal mines have been declared "essential industries" within the terms of the Defence of Canada Regulations. Authorities have been empowered to use the provisions in the regulations to proceed against anyone impeding production or impairing the efficiency of collieries.

OFFICIALS say that the move is not intended to interfere with the legal rights of trade unions, but that it is aimed against persons who might try to reduce production or persuade miners to stop work.
