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LOBSTER SHIPMENTS NEED GREAT CARE

Lobsters form an important industry in the Maritime Provinces and Canadian National Railways officials believe the landed value of this season's catch will approximate three million dollars. The express department handles large consignments of live lobster, the principal market for which is in the United States, but Canadian living in Quebec, Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto and the West are equally fond of this choice delicacy and their purchases are in proportion. Proper icing and water require constant care. Ice is not applied directly to live lobsters, the special containers having separate compartments for fish and ice.


