- Chocolate Half and Half**
 1 or 2 egg yolks
 2 cups milk
 3 cup quick-cooking tapioca
 1/2 cup sugar
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/2 cup chocolate sauce

Mix egg yolks with 1/2 cup milk in a blender. Add quick-cooking tapioca, 1/2 cup sugar and salt and remaining milk. Bring mixture to a boil over direct heat stirring constantly. Remove from fire. Mix hot milk with the chocolate sauce. Add remaining sugar gradually, stirring until it melts. Put into a glass or plastic container. Chill. This mixture is good for dipping fruit. For a special treat, dip fruit in the mixture and then in the chocolate sauce.

French Surprise Sherbet

- 1 cup sugar
 1 small water
 1 teaspoon gelatin
 2 cups lemon juice
 1 lemon
 2 oranges

Boil sugar and water together for five minutes and the gelatin softens in a cold water. When the mixture is cold add the lemon juice which has been pressed through a sieve and the juice of lemons and oranges. Chill.

Corn at Its Best

Put your corn in a pot of water and boil for five minutes. Drain and add a dash of butter and salt. This is a simple but delicious way to enjoy your corn.

At night, if you are tired, you can eat a cornucopia of corn. It is a perfect snack for any time of day. You can also use it in a variety of dishes. For example, you can make a corn salad or a corn soup. The possibilities are endless.

Boiled Green Corn

To have this vegetable in perfect form, the husks should be left on until just before it is to be boiled. Plunge the husked ears into boiling water and cook from seven to twelve minutes according to the size of the ears. Do not salt the cooking water as this toughens the corn. Lay a napkin on the serving plate. Lift the corn upon this in a pyramid cover it with the corners of the napkin and serve it to the table. Never use salt in the water in which green corn is boiled. Either use plain water or use a touch of sugar instead of salt.

Address Soldiers Mail In-ink

Postmaster, I have a special interest in providing a safe and expeditious service for the soldiers overseas. One of the most important factors in this service is the use of ink. All mail should be fully prepaid and a return address given in the upper left hand corner. Letters, parcels and newspapers for our troops overseas should be addressed in INK as follows: Regimental Number, Rank and Name, Name and Details of Unit or Company Section, Squadron, Battalion, Holding Unit, etc., Name of Regiment or Branch of Service, Canadian Army Overseas. If the soldier is still in Canada, mail should be addressed to him giving the following: Regimental Number, Rank and Name, Name and Details of Unit as above, Name of Regiment or Branch of Service, Name of the Place in Canada where the Unit is stationed.

Belgians Resist Nazi "New Order"

Opposition Passive But United in King and People

LONDON (CP) Belgium's passive resistance against the German continues unabated and attempts to bring the country into Hitler's "new order" have met with failure.

A correspondent writing in "The Times" said recent evidence from a Belgian source showed King Leopold has been firm in his uncompromising refusal to associate with an "all-Belgium" ministry composed of King and Flemings pro-Nazi parties.

A strike-squad circulated in Brussels, claiming that the King recently received a fascist order, who is reported to have refused to sign it. The King listened to the report and then suddenly broke up the meeting by remarking: "The audience which was imposed on me last night was a far from a good one."

Three Provinces
 Campaigns against the Nazis in the three provinces of Belgium, Flanders, Walloon and Brussels, were claimed that the country would be divided into three provinces: Belgium, Flanders and Brussels.

The occupying forces have tried to carry out their "policy" in Belgium. At a meeting of their passive resistance, was noted last winter when German authorities announced anti-tank operations in the Belgian General Staff along the eastern frontier would be removed and asked local authorities to provide labor. The Belgian government refused the request and involved clauses of the Hague convention which forbids an occupying power to requisition labor for military purposes.

Apples Fought In B. C. Crops Peaches Better

West Coast Province in Middle of Fruit Harvest With General Prospects Good

 VANCOUVER (CP) - British Columbia's fruit growing and farming districts are reaping with activity with farmers taking advantage of good harvesting weather to get their produce to market.

Looking up some fruit, such as cherries, strawberries, raspberries and apricots has been completed and wholesalers here now are receiving supplies of apples, peaches, plums, pears and early pears.

The apple crop, British Columbia's main fruit crop, will be lighter this year than in 1940 due to high weather in the blossom period and to attack from codling moths. The latest estimate made by the horticultural branch of the provincial agriculture department places the production of the Okanagan Valley at 1,000,000 boxes.

Government Guarantee
 Although the estimate for the 1941 lower Okanagan and Kootenay Valley crops are projected by a Dominion government guarantee of 4,000,000 boxes, the government is prepared to pay 40 cents per box for any difference between this figure and the actual yield.

An increase of about 12 per cent is expected in the peach crop this year with a production of 85,000 crates, an increase of 73,000 over last year. There is a steady supply of field tomatoes reaching the market here from the Okanagan and the bean crop has just started to move during the past few days. The Okanagan tomatoes are said to be of good quality and in good demand.

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Best Seed and Flax
 Harvesting of sugar beet seed and the flax crop in the Fraser Valley started about July 28 and now is nearing completion. Both of these are new developments in British Columbia agriculture.

The oats harvest also is getting under way in the Fraser Valley. The stand is considered good although July rains caused slight bogging in the lower lying areas.

Bobo plants in the Fraser Valley are in good condition and hope are making good growth. There are prospects of a good season for both these crops.

Prairies Digging Ducks' Preserve

California Sportsman Helps Out With a Machine for Bird Dugouts

WINNIPEG (CP) - A \$2,000 duck removing machine donated by an anonymous California sportsman is helping Ducks Unlimited (Canada) build duck "factories" in Western Canada so Northern American hunters might have more mudhats to shoot in future years.

The machine named "The Mud After It Goes" nicknamed "Winnipeg" recently for Hanna, Alta. where it will make 20 dugouts in a strip 150 miles wide along the Alberta Saskatchewan border. The dugout has killed millions of ducks every summer.

These dugouts will become ponds next spring and will save duck broods from death in 1942 and onwards. Ducks Unlimited, an international non-profit association that has built 100,000 dugouts in four years.

Finance totaling approximately \$200,000 supplied by United States sportsmen enabled Ducks Unlimited to build water conservation that has been a big help in increasing the duck population in the West.

The Minister said that the fishermen have been working hard to supply the war effort. He praised their courage and sacrifice.

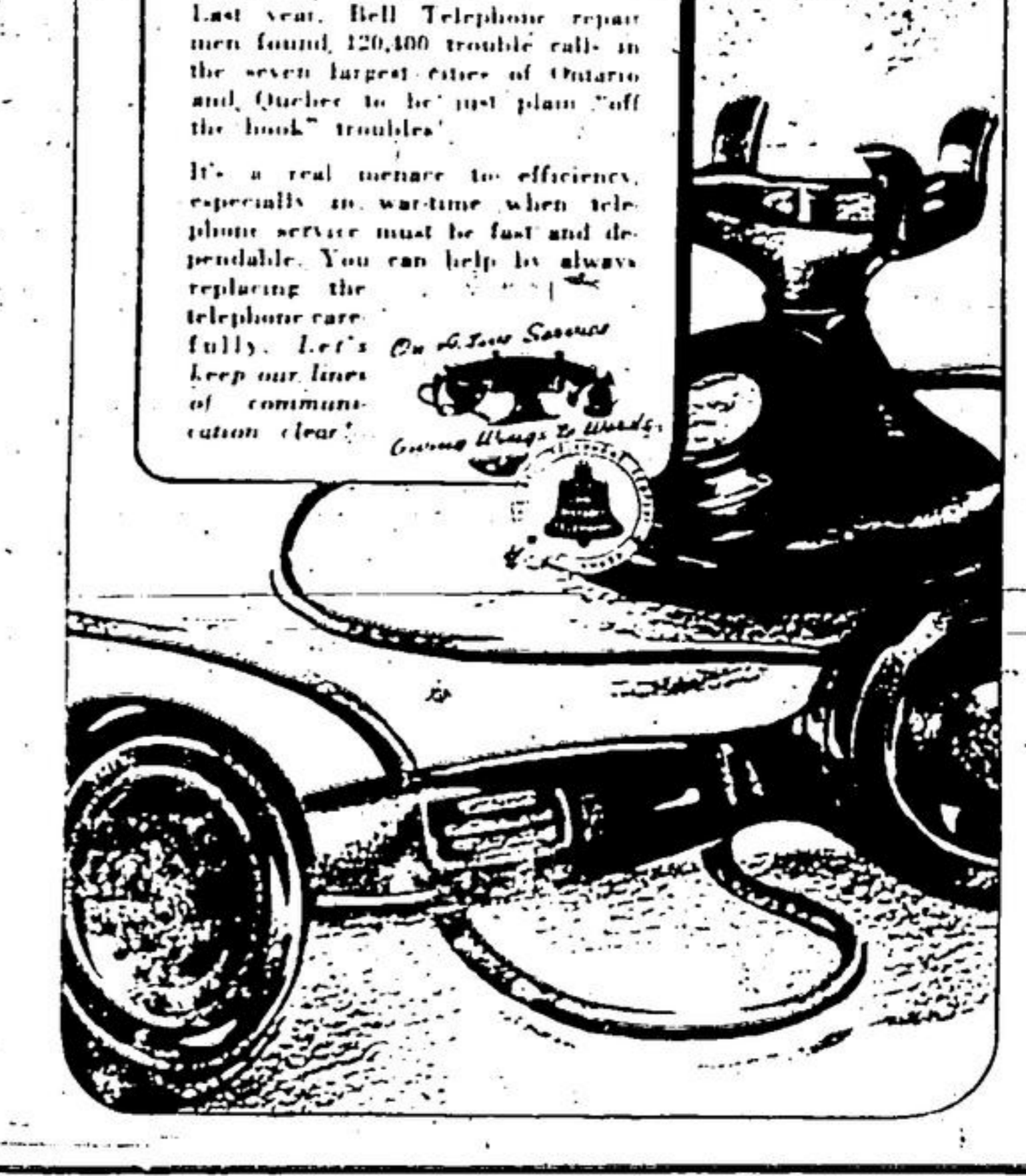
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Every Car Should Have One
