At the conclusion of the show, the display of Gladliol, by Mr. Wm. Harris were disposed of, and proceeds from them and other exhibits in the show were donated for war work.

Deaths from fatal accidents on the highways of Ontario for the first six months of 1941 total 64 more than for the corresponding period of 1940. The increase is at the rate of 25%.

The number of deaths in 190 (given by the Bureau of Statistics as 746) for the full year was the highest for the period of record, 1926 to 1940, save one. The year 1937 showed Ontario highway fatalities at 766.

In this phenomenal rise of motor fatalities, increased traffic due to war, no doubt, played its part. Increased wages and employment with more money, and more old cars on the road driven by persons lacking experience added some. Increased drinking, the cumulative result of habit and of freer money, was, no doubt, a major cause.

Dr. Logan Clendening, syndicate writer, speaking of the investigations of road accidents in the U.S., and the findings "doubtless would be similar here, said: "Alcohol with the attending varying degrees of alcoholic intoxication, can be considered "the greatest single factor."

The limiting of gasoline with the resulting curb of carousing at night, will probably check the rise. Otherwise, we are in for a hair-raising record of highway fatalities for the current year.
