Beardmore said that he felt the functions of a Fair were to encourage farmers to breed, feed and put on the market better stock and better crops. The fair also brought farmers and townspeople in touch with each other. We must not however, lose sight of the fact even if 'Fair time' to-day we face the greatest crisis we have ever known. This is Reconciliation Week and it is well for us to pause and take stock of what we are doing for Canada. The farming community of Canada is the larder for Britain. But there is a lot of thinking on industry too in Canada. We must create the national wealth to pay for this war and Col. Beardmore emphasized that by the term national wealth he did not infer individual wealth. He wondered if we in Canada were taking our responsibilities seriously enough. If we are not doing what is fair on our farm or in industry then we should in uniform be taking our share in the battle for freedom. Col. Beardmore urged that all pause and query ourselves if we are doing all we can for victory. In closing he wished Acton Fair continued success and declared the 1941 Fair officially opened. Then Messrs. V. B. Rumley and J. M. McDonald who have charge of the field took the event in hand. Rex Slocumbe the entertainer who has delighted Acton crowd before was on hand with his fun. He was assisted this year by Doug. McTague, Mountain Singer and his banjo. They are two artists who certainly pleased the crowd. Evidence to this was seen in the crowd around the stand when each of them performed. There were other events on the stand too. In a banana eating contest Melvin McCullough, R. R. No. 1, Guelph, gulped his fruit with greatest speed. The old-time fiddlers' contest had Neil McDonald, R. R. No. 1, Guelph, taking first place and Mr. Niel of Limehouse winning second prize. Ralph Franklin, R. R. No. 2, Wingham, took the prize for step dancing. Babies and their mothers in the Robinson Baby Show were also on the stand. For boys under six months old David, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Norton won the prize and over six months old the baby boy of Mr. and Mrs. E. Suter was prize winner. For baby girls under six months old Marie, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alex. Mitchell was the prize winner and Valerie, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. Valey was the best girl over six months old. There were no entries for twins this year. Some events on the track were the gentlemen's road race won by S. Somerville, Hillsburg, Miss W. Wheeler second and S. Somerville, third. Best lady rider was Miss Joan Gaveland, Brampton and Mrs. C. Armer, Hillsburg. Best lady driver was Mrs. R. M. Barden, Hillsburg, and Mrs. Robert Kerr, Acton. The potato race was a keenly contested event with H. Brown winning first, P. Laidlaw and Son, second and J. Devereaux, third. The jumping horses were featured in the horse ring. Best pair jumpers were those of G. Ellison, first and Miss Vivian Clarke, second. The high jump was again won by Miss Vivian Clarke's entry with Mr. Ledson second and another entry of Miss Clarke's took third money. The quilting bee by the Women's Institute was a new feature and on the lawn at the park entrance proved attractive. Utoka Institute won first with Rocking second and Dublin branch third. The oldest married couple attending Acton Fair were Mr. and Mrs. Wm. McLaughlin, R. R. No. 4, Guelph, who on November 30th of this year will observe their sixtieth wedding anniversary. Three new features were the Beef and Dairy Calf and Foal Exhibits, N. McCullum, Milton, won the beef calf event; Dairy Calf exhibit was won by Bev. There was a Ferris Wheel, Merry-go-Round, auto ride and three or four sleds and the usual array of games and refreshment stands and eating places. Judging by the crowd there, all afternoon a lot of visitors found amusement here. Daylight and standard times were accountable for judging of livestock to be delayed the latest of any time in the history of the fair. This late completion of the work made it impossible to arrange the usual parade of livestock and the omission of this was a disappointment to many although seemingly unavoidable. The showing of horses was a splendid one this year. Both heavy and light horses had a good entry. The cattle also had a good showing in both the dairy and beef breeds. The hog pens were filled with the exhibits in this class and there was a fair showing of sheep. The poultry exhibit was this year in the horse shed

and while not as large as sometimes seen here was fair. The complete list of winners in the field will be given next week in The Fair News. We present this week the winners in the hull classes. While the midway packed up and rolled away in the evening and the fair grounds was gradually deserted the annual fair night dance was held in the Town Hall. Here again a splendid crowd attended and enjoyed dancing to the music of the Doris Hull Orchestra. Perhaps the conversations with President Symon or Secretary Thetford or any of the directors may have been interrupted with a yawn to-day and perhaps the smiles were not as radiant but Acton Fair has again been a real success for 1941 and energy will be directed by the group to making next year's fair an even greater event.
