The Crimean peninsula, half the size of Nova Scotia, is good ground for winter fighting—its mild climate has given it the name of Russian Riviera. Three mountain ranges form a windbreak on its southeastern coast; flat steps slope largely in wheat, take up three-fourths of its area. Inland Simferopol is the capital.

Women "Manning" Airplane Plant

One-Third Staff of One Spitfire Factory of the Gentler Sex

SOMEWHERE IN ENGLAND, (C. P.)—One-third of the hundreds of workers at a government airplane factory here are women. They play a vital part in the job of transforming raw materials into finished Spitfires.

Immediate aim of the plant management is to raise the ratio of women working in the factory to 60 per cent. They are gradually taking over the most complicated processes of riveting, pressing and assembly work.

At present most of the women are drawn from the immediate locality. Shortage of housing accommodation will be the chief obstacle when the time comes to transfer women from other districts.

LABOR DILUTION GOOD

LONDON, (CP)—Dilution of skilled labor in Britain's roaring war factories has been a success, according to authoritative labor quarters. A year ago percentage of skilled labor in factories ranged from 35 to 38 but now has dropped to about 20—and yet output has risen.
