Under-cover activities of anti-Nazi elements in all the occupied countries are increasing rapidly and executions of hostages and other harsh, repressive measures have failed to stop them.

Word of Russia's stubborn defence has spread throughout the dominated areas and the removal of large numbers of troops from the west to the Russian theatre of war has given the conquered peoples renewed courage.

Armed clashes have occurred between German occupying troops and patriots in Norway where Hitler's soldiers have found it particularly difficult to maintain order ever since the country was conquered.

Disorders in occupied France led to the bombing of six Paris Synagogues and acts of sabotage are reported from Denmark and the Netherlands.

Executions in Yugoslavia have been more numerous than in any other occupied country, but death sentences have reached big proportions in France and Bohemia-Moravia too.

How long Hitler will be able to hold the masses in these countries in check provides plenty of scope for speculation. Armies of occupation have to be kept up and, away from the homeland, these are likely to become disaffected, not only by inaction but also by anti-Nazi views which it is said, find frequent expression in the conquered peoples becoming bolder and bolder.

Hitler's "V for Victory" campaign, conducted by radio, is a constant spur to the dominated peoples to slow up production and in other ways to hinder the Germans from getting food materials and equipment for their armies.

While the sabotage continues and Britain, aided by the United States, builds-up her armies and the paraphernalia of war, Russia holds German armies in check on the long front from the Baltic to the Black Sea.

At the week-end the German High Command declared a big move was in preparation on the Eastern Front, but all reports from the war front definitely favored the Russians.

Advisers from Moscow and neutral sources on Oct. 6 declared that the valiant defenders of Leningrad had broken through the German lines around the city at several points.

The counter-offensive was said to be a real reverse for the Germans. The whole right wing of Marshal Wilhelm Ritter von Lee's army was swung back and

Communication restored between the Russian armies in the north and south.

The following day the Russian High Command announced successes on the central front, the capture of many villages and an advance of about 13 miles in the Gomel area.

It is probable that Germany will direct all the pressure possible in the south where the move into the Ukraine impeded the Donets basin with its great cities of Kharkov and Rostov.

Conflicting reports regarding Hitler's new offensive are coming out of Moscow and Berlin. While Russian spokesmen claimed Oct. 7 that the big Nazi drive was being aimed at Moscow, a bulletin from Hitler's headquarters on the Eastern Front indicated that a battle developing north of the Sea of Azov was part of the "gigantic new developments" which the German Chancellor himself declared begun Oct. 1.

The Russians say that terrific losses have been inflicted on the Nazi army on the central front, adding that the entire Russian nation is being mobilized to meet the assault.

It was also reported in London in the fighting north of the sea of Azov the Germans had been checked. Guns of the Soviet Black Sea fleet were also reported to be bombarding the Germans in this area.

Submarines Active British naval units continue to harass Axis shipping in the Mediterranean.

It was reported Tuesday that submarines had sunk four and seriously damaged seven Axis ships attempting the hazardous trip to Libyan ports.

British sources estimate that 851,000 tons of Italian shipping, nearly one-third of Mussolini's merchant fleet, has been sent to the bottom in the Mediterranean.

"Munitions superiority must be achieved to ensure defeat of the Axis," it was stated in a report brought down at Washington by the House of Representatives—Appropriation Committee which approved a \$5,985,000,000 lend-lease appropriation Oct. 8.
