Nickel In Soot Important Crop

Factory Dustman Finds Big By Product for Electric Plant

SCHNECTADY, N.Y., (CP) -Fifty housand nounds of Inctory dust sayed by a Scotsman has helped solve a serlous shortage in nickel, vital essential f Uncle Sam's defence program.

Enough nickel has been recovered from the dust to supply 20 per cent. of the needs at the General Electric plant in West Lynn, Mass., for th manufacture of tiny magnets in electrical metres in airplanes and other

These magnets are the smallest and most powerful in the world. When the magnets are ground, the grindings form a black, sooty-looking-dust, partly grinding material, partly nickel and other metals. It is swept out and

poured into barrels. It has been going to the scrap pile in charge of Charley Stevens. Believing the metal in the dust ought to bring a price from some scrap dealer, Stevens hoarded the soot until he had 50,000 pounds saved and the company metallurgist found it yielded an important fraction of nickel needed for t the plant.
