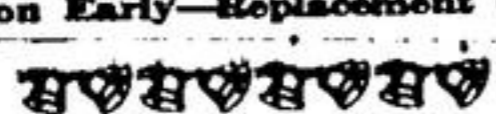

## E. Harrop Re-Elected Head of Livestock Improvement Assoc.

The marketing of light weight and other low grade hogs will if continued, seriously hinder the fulfillment of the Canadian bacon contract stated W. P. Watson, Assistant Director of the Ontario Livestock Branch at the annual meeting of the Halton Livestock Improvement Association held in Milton on Saturday afternoon of last week. Mr. Watson appealed to the audience to make sure their hogs were in the 200 lb. live weight category before shipping them to market. This would assure better prices and aid the Government, in filling the stupendous 600,000,000 pound order for high class bacon for Britain.

Mr. Watson pointed out that every time an under-weight hog is sold by the farmer he loses the Ontario Government subsidy of \$1.00 per carcass for a Grade A hog and 50 cents for a B1. An underweight carcass in the class called light is subject to a \$2.50 discount. A light hog weighing 150 to 170 lb. can be finished up to 200 pounds and bring the owner \$5.00 profit on the transaction. Extra feed should not cost more than an additional \$3.00 and the selling price could be increased \$8.00. It was further pointed out that 1,534 light weight hogs were sent to market here last month that might just as well have been fed up to the 200 lb. mark. Out of every 10 hogs marketed 8 will have to be exported if we are to fill our contract to Britain, stated Mr. Watson. He further pointed out that the quality of the bacon we export now will largely determine our market in the post war period.

A sound film in technicolor entitled "Bacon for Britain" was displayed through the courtesy of the Federal Department. This depicted the various steps in the processing of bacon from the time it leaves the farmer's yard until it reaches seaboard. The election of officers resulted as follows:

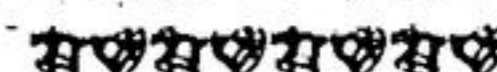

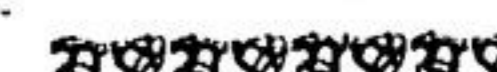

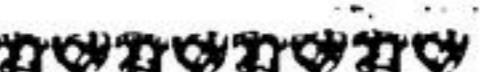
