The annual report of the Lakeside Chapter I.O.D.E. presented at a recent meeting shows this organization to have closed a year of successful community effort. It is herewith given in full. Despite the stress and strain of war, 1941 was a year of outstanding activity in the Lakeside Chapter Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire. The Chapter had a very successful year with war work being the major part of its activity. In the past few months also carried on as usual. During the year the Chapter held twelve business meetings and five social meetings and at each of these meetings interesting and educational talks were given by guest speakers and a summary of current events by members of the Chapter. To raise funds a dance and a bingo were held and a film was sponsored at the local theatre. Christmas cards were also sold by members. Wool was purchased and accessories for the Comforts Committee, also co-operated with the War Service League in several war work projects and members helped in sending Christmas boxes to boys overseas. A War Savings Certificate was purchased and the Chapter sponsored a float in the Victory Loan Campaign parade held here. A War Savings Secretary was also appointed and War Savings Stamps were sold at every meeting. The Chapter organized Acton and district for the regular collection of salvage which is now being successfully carried on. Donations throughout 1941 were given to the following: War Services Fund, Army Dental Corps, Park Supervisor, Navy R. Moore Memorial Fund, Navy League, Endowment Fund, Tuoy Morrison Memorial Fund, Lord Mayors' Fund, Sailors and Miners' Fund, Soldiers' Resettlement Centre Fund, Children's Hospital Fund sponsored by The Acton - British War Victims' Fund. A wreath was purchased and placed on the cenotaph and flags were purchased and soldiers' graves decorated on Remembrance Day. Members helped the Acton Branch Canadian Legion in the selling of poppies on Remembrance Day. A poor Northern school was adopted and the regular library sent, also an additional supply of books. Gifts and clothing were sent at Christmas for each pupil. Rings were purchased to be awarded to the High School boy and girl for general proficiency throughout the year. A prize was also given to the local Fall Fair. Flowers and cards were sent to sick and bereaved members and visits made. Cards were also sent at Christmas to out-of-town members.
