Erin Agricultural Society Helps British War-Victims' Fund

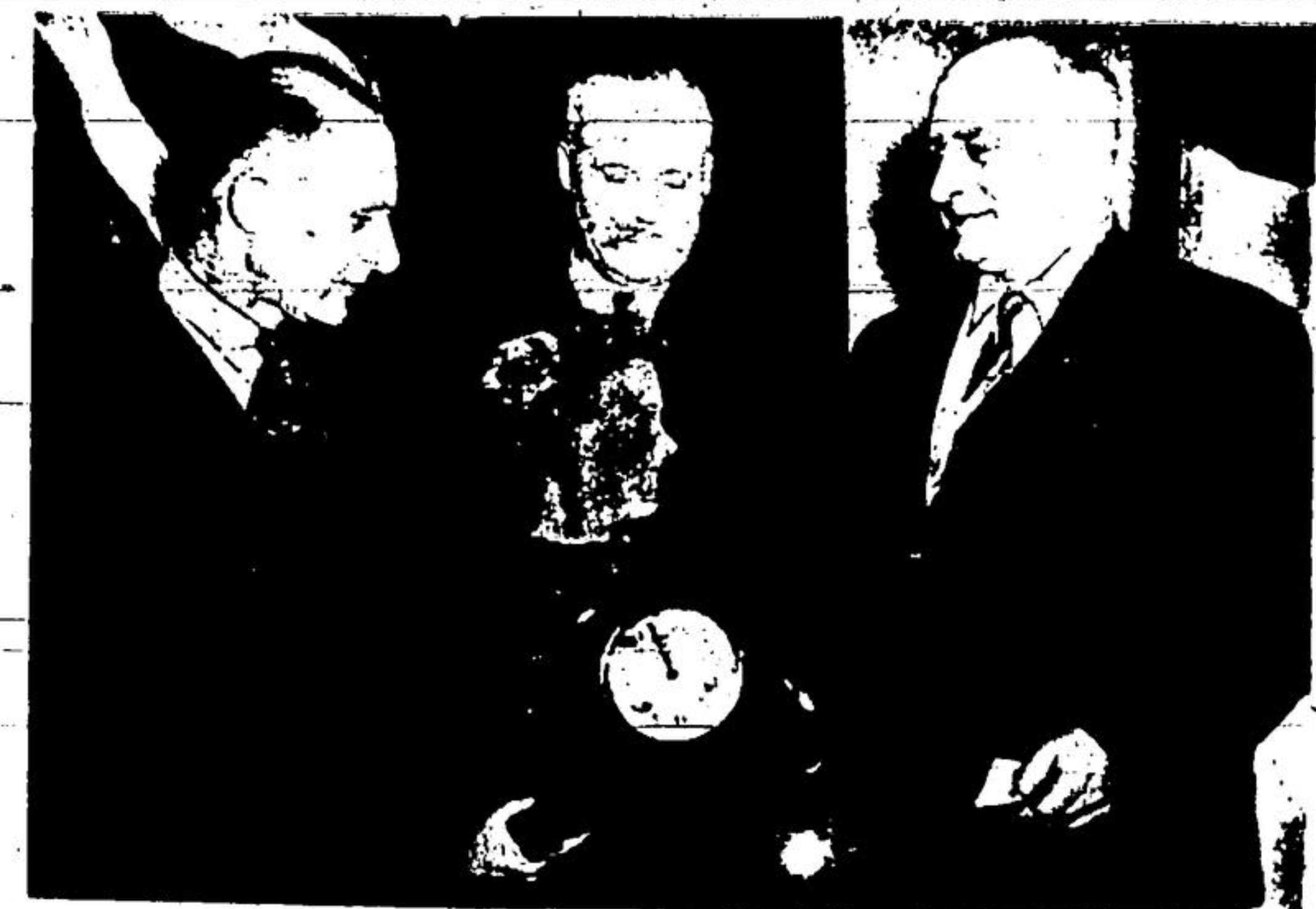
