### County Council Approves New Bridge At Glenwilliams

the regular subsidy on same. (3) That on receipt of the Department's approval the County Engineer proceeded with the preparation of plan and the calling of tenders for the construction of this bridge.—Carried. Mr. Vanisickle, Campbellville, addressed the Council briefly, asking them to use their influence to secure better railway service for the village of Campbellville. At present only one down train stops at the station and none going up. "We are asked to save rubber and gas," said Mr. Vanisickle, "and yet no way is provided for anyone to leave the village other than by car." Council agreed the complaint was justified and the following resolution was passed:

Moved by Mr. Heslop, seconded by Mr. Craig, that the council instruct the clerk to write the Railway Board for additional train service to the village of Campbellville, requesting that the morning train at 7:25 a.m. and the evening train at 6:30 p.m. stop instead of the present one at 8:25 a.m.—Carried.

Mr. Gilbert informed council of the fact that the Department of Highways has requested that road expenditures by law be reduced from \$67,500 to \$50,000. Council felt this was hardly advisable and the following resolution was passed:

Moved by Mr. Gilbert, seconded by Mr. Kerns (1) That this council advise the Department of Highways that they disapprove of the reduction of Road Expenditure by law from \$67,500 to \$50,000. (2) And that in view of the reduction the ratepayers of the county will be called upon to contribute more than 50 per cent. of the expenditure necessary to adequately maintain our road system. Now therefore be it resolved that the Department of Highways be requested to restore the Road Expenditure by law to \$67,500.—Carried.

With regard to insurance the following resolutions and amendments were put before the council.

Moved by Mr. McDonald, seconded by Mr. Hillmer that we place our Workmen's Insurance with the Workmen's Compensation Board of Ontario.

An amendment was:

Moved by Mr. Gilbert, seconded by Mr. Kerns: That we place our Workmen's Compensation Insurance with A. E. Wilson as Robert Ford as agent. The amendment carried.

Moved by Mr. Hillmer, seconded by Mr. McDonald: That the Road Liability Insurance be awarded to the Anglo Scottish Insurance at a premium of \$485.88.

An amendment was moved by Dr. Heslop, seconded by Mr. Robertson: That we accept the road liability premium of Continental Insurance Co. 10-20 and 2 for \$316.60. Carried.

Unlike the old time circuit riders, the 40-year-old Church of the Nazarene minister would never be recognized as such by the casual passer-by because "I never start a conversation until the fare says something."
