- (1) The fuel oil restrictions in the New England States will require six million additional tons of anthracite and it is very doubtful if this additional quantity will be available.
- (2) The sale of By-product Coke in nut or larger sizes for domestic use is prohibited by government order.
- (3) All anthracite has to be moved by rail instead of large quantities by water as in former years and together with generally larger railway traffic, will make shipments uncertain and slow.
- (4) The importation of Welsh Anthracite will be much smaller or probably non-existent.
- (5) The shipment of Alberta coal cannot be greatly increased due to labor and transportation limitations.
