Canada's New Budget (Continued from Page One)

bare necessities of life and when we should all be asked to give or lend all of the excess for war purposes. During last year Canada financed just over 70 per cent. of her total war coat out of current revenue raised by taxation but in addition to this we loaned to Great Britain eleven hundred million dollars and we in turn borrowed from our own people for the express purpose of the loan to Britain which enabled her to buy war supplies which she required. A real effort is now to be made to drive down the domestic demand for consumer goods so that the raw materials which would otherwise go for domestic use will be available for war equipment. In order to accomplish this and taxation of private income has been very sharply increased, and a compulsory savings plan instituted.
