bare necessities of life and when we should all be asked to give or lend all of the excess for war purposes."

During last year Canada financed just over 70 per cent. of her total war cost out of current revenue raised by taxation but in addition to this we loaned to Great Britain eleven hundred million dollars and we in turn porrowed from our own people for the express purpose of the loan to Britain which enabled her to buy war supplies which she required.

A real effort is now to be made to drive down the domestic demand for consumer goods so that the raw materials which would otherwise go for domestic use will be available for war equipment. In order to accomplish this end taxation of private income has been very sharply increased and a compulsory savings plan instituted. All of the excess profits of industry are to be taken for war purposes. The following is a brief summary of the income tax:
