

CANADA NEEDS MORE WOOL NOW SAVE GOOD EWES

Few Canadians have stopped to consider our precarious position, with respect to wool supplies. Perhaps the following facts will provide food for thought: The fleeces from at least nine sheep are needed to equipment, for one soldier. has now well over (900,000) men in the armed services, hence wool requirements for military purposes alone involves the total production of about 5,500,000 sheep. On December 1st last, Canada's sheep population was about 3,500,000 head, nearly 2,000,000 less than the number required to supply-wool-for-our armed forces One does not need to be a mathematician to figure out the fate of Canada's 11,000,000 civilians should anything occur to seriously interfere with im-

In the light of these facts, every ewe lamb suitable for breeding purposes should be saved. Farnters are being urged to increase sheep production. Surveys, conducted in varlong countles of the province, indicate that they are responding to the appeal. The results in Halton' are typical of the trend in many others.

In this area, 63 farmers claimed

ownership of 1,363 sheep. 95 of these ewes will be discarded during the present year on account of having autitived their usefulness. 300 lambs will be refained. After making allowance for replacements, the increase will be 304 head or 22.3%. That many farmers are going all out in their efforts, is indiented by the fact that quite a numher of the men reporting intend keeping all their ewe lambs. The remainder of the farmers will have 180 ewe lambs for sale. Complete defails about these lambs are, in the hands of the Agricultural representative.

In order to prevent their slaughter, the Ontario Department of Ag riculture is planning to buy good ambs on the market and to assemble them at a depot established in the Toronto area. The lambs so as sembled will constitute a reserve supply and will be offered for sale to anyone who wishes to purchase them, but more particularly to supply th requirements of countles where local

counties where the supply 'exceeds The demand so long as that condition exists. Men wishing to establish nou flocks, are, therefore, urged to ex-'plore the altuation locally before seeking supplies elsewhere.
