CANADIAN PILOT GETS NAZI PLANE AND WINS WAGER

Many in this district will be interested in the success of Pilot Officer Joe Loree of Guelph in downing a Nazi plane in combat in the Middle East as told in a report received in Guelph. Pilot Officer Loree is a brother of Roy Loree, formerly of Acton and a nephew of Mrs. J. C. Matthews, Acton.

A Canadian pilot-officer in the R. A.F. was £4 richer and the Luftwaffe one plane poorer as a result of a little "sporting proposition" the Canuck airman made during the long sea voyage out from Britain.

P.O. J. E. Loree, of Guelph, Ont., spent hours during the trip discussing with two other Canadian airmen and a pair of Australian flyers their anticipations of what desert fighting would be like. Each of the five was confident he would be the first to down a Nazi plane, and, at Loree's suggestion, staked £1 each on that belief.

Loree settled the argument and collected £1 from each of his four shipmates soon after he arrived in Egypt, when he participated in a raid on two enemy airfields by R.A.F. light bombers and fighter bombers escorted by squadrons of fighters.

Loree, at the controls of a fighter bomber, was one of the first to attack. There were several enemy craft in the air and he dived after a Junkers 88. The German bomber after from Loree's tracer bullets, crashed in flames. Only one member of its crew managed to ball out in time.

Fort Erie (Ont.) Times-Review: The Malcolm MacBeth Memorial Shield for the best editorial page in Class 2.

Acton (Ont.) Free Press: The Hugh Savage Shield for the best all-around paper with a circulation of 500 to 1,000, and the special prize of the Printer and Publisher for the best front page.

Creston (B.C.) Review: The John W. Eddy Memorial Trophy for the best editorial page in Class 3.

Whitehorse (Yukon) Star: The Charters Cup for the best all-around weekly with a circulation under 500.
