Men who are not in a medical cateory now being called for service inthe Active Army are asked to volunteer for service as special constables in the Royal Canadian Mounted Po-

Commissioner S T. Wood, who issued the call this week pointed out that the Order-in-Council which gives the Minister of National War Services power to call out men in the lower medical brackets for special security guard duty will not be implemented "for the time being."

"Rather than implement this Orderin-Council by compulsory service, the government has decided for the time being to give those-men who have in the past, and who may in the future wish to volunteer for such service, an opportunity to do so" the Com-

missioner's statement-read. · Those who are subject to National War Service Registration but of a low medical category, (B1, B2, C1) as well as others who wished to serve, should communicate with him in Ot-

tawa, he added. "The rates of pay and allowances which will be paid for this work are identical with those paid in the Canadian Active Army" Commissioner Wood's statement concluded.


