As a Royal Canadian Navy ship-of-war pulls away from the dock, officers of the Army and the Navy stand at the rail. Here is symbolized the co-operation between two services which enables swift movement of military forces on Canada's coastline, to shore positions, inaccessible by other means of transportation. Between all three of the armed services there is a high degree of co-ordination in defence, combining in a never-faltering vigil prepared to meet the enemy from any angle of approach to Canada.
